#### Will War Burdens Bring in Protection.

It is evident that at the present time there is likely to be a severe attack on free trade in England. Many books and newspaper articles are written to show that the times have changed so much of late that some form of protection is needed. There has always been a large minority in England in favor of protection, or "reciprocity," and there are several reasons why this party should be especially active now, and should seek to turn itself into a majority. The large majority of the present Government contains within itself many of those who are in favor of some form of protection, mild, of course, at first, but stronger afterwards; that is, as strong as the country can stand. With the Liberal party disorganized, it is natural that this cry should be raised. Then there is the war, which calls for fresh taxation. The ordinary taxpayer will find that war is a costly thing, and that he is called to pay, pay, pay. The Government will naturally look for something that can be taxed most easily, as the income tax, fruitful as it is, has its limits. So it is suggested that there should be a little protection introduced as a war tax; not as a permanent thing, you know, but just as a temporary expediency, until we are through with those dreadful Boers, and can draw upon the gold mines.

Then there are those who think that this will gradually open the way to the very desirable imperial customs union. that is, free trade within the Empire, and protection against all outside. This all seems very natural and very plausible, but to those who look all round there is no disguising the fact that it is a ticklish situation. It shows the tremendous issues started by this "little war," when we find it one day threatening England with the conscription, and the next with a return to protection. Pressure is no doubt brought to bear upon the Government from many directions, but we believe that they will go slow, as slow as they can. To the members of the present Imperial Govfetich. The memory of Cobden and Gladstone is not specially sacred to them. They are quite ready to keep an pen mind on economic subjects. But they know well enough that this is a serious business, and they will think hard and long before they reverse the fiscal policy which has done such great things for Britain during the last half

a century. No doubt new problems have arisen, the nation must face new situations, and meet new needs, but the nation will expect from its leaders great caution and wisdom in dealing with a matter of such immense importance. For ourselves, we do not expect to see any quick return to protection in England. In a country where there are so many millions who must have the world's products at the cheapest possible rate, it will be difficult to go back to the old methods of taxation. According to the protectionists, free trade is a broken idol which only needs a vigorous kick to send it to destruction. That may be so. We are not going to argue it now, but there is just another possibility, and that is this may be the rock upon which an apparently invincible government may strike and find their ruin. We have always regretted a war which involved so much misery and strain. We shall regret it still more if one of its first results is to lay new and heavy burdens on the British tax-payer which may make him realize in a more powerful sense than ever before the cost of Empire. We can understand how it is that a number of causes are co-operating to increase the demand for protection, but we are not convinced that it is a movement in the right direction or that it will meet with speedy success.

### The Steel Combination.

The often suggested steel combination bids fair to become a reality. The Carnegie company has of late shown signs of setting aside its policy of aggressive competition. It has been reported recently upon good authority, and also to a practical application of that the following companies are about to undergo the process of

unification: Carnegie Company, with authorized capital of ......\$320,000,000 Federal Steel Company .... 200,000,000 American Steel and Wire 90,000,000 80,000,000

It is stated by the president of the Federal Stee! Company that the aggregation, when completed, will not violate the statutes against contracts to establish monopolies, raise prices or restrict production. Realizing the fact that the capitalization of the new trust will approach one thousand million dollars, it is not clear how this can be accomplished. It is clear, however, that if this combination is comp'eted and maintained the era is past when the small capitalist can carry on the iron industry independently.

#### Speedy Postal Service in the Country.

It is believed that the Canadian Post master-General will at an early day begin an experiment in more speedy postal delivery in closely-settled rural localities. This fact gives interest to the plan which is to have a trial in some sections of the United States in the ensuing year. Experiments are to be made over the border with what is known as "Machen's country postoffice," which is a scheme designed to fill in the gap between rural delivery and the city free delivery, or at least to adapt itself to certain half-way places not otherwise provided for. It is named in honor of the superintendent of the free delivery system. The plan is to erect in each neighborhood where a dozen or more families may live some distance away from the village postoffice a structure containing twentyfour boxes. Each householder would have a key to one box opening at the front, while a postal employe would have a key opening the entire back of the beehive. He would come up from the main office after the arrival of each mail and distribute what had come into these boxes, making his way around to all the little groups of families thereabouts. Nobody would then need be farther than a half or a quarter of a mile from a mail distributing point, except in the districts which are soon to be covered by a strictly rural delivery. Of course, such a plan cannot be carried out without a good deal of expense. and it would be of little value where the householder lived within a measurably short distance from the rural postoffice. Might not the work of distribution be undertaken by a clever mail carrier, while making his daily round, and could he not collect letters to go out on his return trip?

#### February Labor Gazette.

The February Labor Gazette contains some very important statements with regard to the industrial situation of Canada. The Canadian Conciliation Act, as a means of settling industrial difficulties by arbitration, is proving successful. Instances are given of its successful operation in connection with a recent lockout in the boot and shoe in-

dustry of Quebec, and a machinist strike in a local manufacturing establishment in Dundas, Ontario, which were brought to an end through ply equally to absentee Senators, of the friendly intervention of the De- whom there are altogether too many. partment of Labor under the Con ciliation Act

Another important subject is that of the opportunities offered settlers in our Northwest. Manitoba, with an area of over 41,000,000 acres, had in 1899 only about two and a half million acres under crop. The Northwest Territories, with a total area of over 343,000,000 acres, had but little over half a million acres under cultivation. The West is resplendent with opportunities for the intending settler. A farm of 160 acres may be had by any bona fide homeseeker, who will fulfill certain nominal requirements. A fee of \$10 is charged for an ordinary homestead entry, except for lands which have been already occupied, when an additional fee of \$5 or 310 may be charged to meet the expenses in connection with cancelling the former title. The regulations governing settlement on Dominion lands in Manitoba and the Northwest Territories require at least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of

three years. A number of important improvements have been made in connection with the mining regulations of the different provinces of the Dominion. In Ontario it is stated that no boy under the age of 15 years shall be employed to work in any mine below ground, and that no woman or girl shall be employed in any mining work whatsoever. The prohibitions, generally speaking, are of a protectional nature, either as regards the employment of minors or hours of labor.

#### OTTAWA NOTES.

Mr. Mulock's moves this session in postal matters will be watched with interest. Last year the House of Commons enacted a measure to reduce the rate per pound charged on newspapers, but the Senate 'blocked the way. The measure should again be passed by the Commons and again presented to the Senate.

One moral from the snap-vote in the Commons, which gave the Government 9 majority instead of 50, is that M.P.s should attend to the duties for which they are elected. That an M.P. should not absent himself without at least pairing with an opponent, goes without saying. But paring is at best an imperfect method of attending to parliamentary duties. The ideal member is the man who is there. These remarks as to Commoners ap-Such positions should be given only to those who will discharge the duties therewith connected. It is time for a little plain speaking.

It is a trifle odd, is it not ,that so little opportunity is taken at Ottawa by the Opposition in the line of the anti-French campaign with which Ontario resounded during the last general election? Two Men Killed in a Head-On Collision Three Badly Hurt and the Train Burned.

Pittsburg, Feb. 28. - Two dead, three burned, is the result of a head-on collision between passenger train No. 16,

# TO CHECK THE PEST

Active Measures to Suppress the Smallpox-Dr. Bryce Advises Vaccination.

Toronto, Feb. 28 .- Dr. Bryce, of the provincial board of health, has completed a plan to check the spread of smallpox in the northern districts by establishing a camp, where all those affected by the disease will be con-centrated. The camp will be situated in the vicinity of Sudbury, and will be under double canvas with accommodation to start with for twelve patients. The smallpox camp will be in opera-tion tomorrow. "I'd advise every-body to get vaccinated," said Dr. Bryce today, to the newspaper re-porters. "It looks as if things were coming our way." He says that besides the cases in Toronto, only one new cases had developed in the north, and that was near Sudbury, where a man suffering from the disease was discovered on the rear of a railway car. He was promptly captured and placed in a hospital. Stringent measures are to be taken to prevent conbadly hurt and a passenger train tagion along the frontier.
