That Russia has a record cereal crop this year is indicated by both the semi-official estimate published a month ago and the more recent estimate of the Russian Ministry of Agriculture, the latter showing a total wheat crop of 60 pounds each in Euro-

pean Russia. Official estimates just made public give the total area under wheat in Germany at 4,725,429 acres, and under rye 15,206,501 acres. While the condition of each of the winter grains is above the average, all three show con-ditions inferior to those of three preceding years.

The cereal harvest of 1902 in Austria is satisfactory, despite unfavorable results in many instances. Wet weather also largely affected the cut grain still lying in the fields. The maize is far below the average. The total cereal production in 1902 in Hungary, including Croatia-Slavonia, as officially reported, is: Wheat, 181,289,-749 bushels; rye, 57,993,339; barley, 63,-286,104; oats, 88,989,870. All these figures are largely in excess of last year's

In France rye is the only cereal crop that falls below the crop of 1901, the year being a good one for all other grain. There is general complaint in France regarding the yield of wine and cider. The official estimate of the Italian wheat crop is 131,101,740, a reduction of 16 per cent. from 1901. Unofficial figures for Great Britain indicate on the whole fairly satisfactory crops, though the quality of the cereals undoubtedly has suffered considerably from the wet weather.


