NEED FOR LOCAL SANATORIA
GROWS MORE PRONOUNCED

The Spread of Consumption Is
Simply Appalling in Ontario
—How to Fight Disease.

During last month there were 207
deaths from tuberculosis in the Province
of Ontario and only 84 deaths
from all other communicable diseases
combined. Just think of that fact and
what it means!

That Canadian health officials now
feel the need of fighting the terrible
disease as they never have before is
evidenced by the intense interest taken
in being taken in the question on all
sides.

The proposition to have a sanatorium
for the county of Middlesex seems to
have been dropped for the present. Such
is not the case in Hamilton. Dr. Rob-
erts, the new medical health offi-
cer of the city, is very much alive to
the need of such a place in that city, for
a consumptive sanatorium, and he is
doing all that he can to bring about
such results.

He has no doubt of his ability to
much-felt lack. He has no doubt of his
ability to find with the work that is being
done by the Gravenhurst people or the To-
ronto institution, but he contends that
neither of these places can ever hope
to be able to care for the many in-
curable cases that are constantly de-
veloping, and which with proper
treatment for a time close at home
would yield.

Since his appointment Dr. Roberts
has looked into the question very care-
fully, and has come to the conclusion
that Hamilton must have its own san-
atorium. The records show that about
one death in every seven in Hamilton
is from tuberculosis, or over one
hundred of the majority of these
people refuse to be sent away to be
treated, preferring to take their

chances at home. During June and
July eighteen persons died from pul-
monary tuberculosis. It is the
insidious and deadly disease known to
modern science, but it has been de-
monstrated that with the proper out-
door treatment even the severest cases
can be checked, if not cured.

Experts say that it is best to treat
patients in the same atmosphere and
climatic conditions in which they are
called on to live, and that is why local
sanatoria are to be preferred. It was
demonstrated last summer by Hellet
Officer McMenemy that the Hamilton
sanatorium was an ideal spot for treat-
ment, but about two months to live.
Meremy said this morning it was sur-
prising the number of consumptives
who were living on the mountain at
the present time and who were deriv-
ing the greatest benefit by their so-
journ there.

It is sanguine that a proposition to
finance a local sanatorium could be
easily managed if the citizens would
awake to the need of having one. Last
year he received a number of offers
of subscriptions from wealthy men if
he could secure the residence at Che-
doke for that purpose. The scheme
failed, however, as the owner
asked more than Mr. McMenemy could
see in sight. He and Dr. Roberts
would like to hear from all persons in-
terested in the subject. The Provincial
Government would pay 25 per cent of
the cost of establishing a sanatorium,
and would pay \$1 a week for every
patient treated therein.

ALD. SAUNDERS WAS HONORED BY
THE FIRE CHIEFS' CONVENTION

Made an Honorary Member of
the Association—Chief and
Alderman Return.

Ald. Saunders, of No. 3 committee,
and Fire Chief Clark, arrived back in
London at midnight last night from
Duluth, where they attended the con-
vention of the Fire Chiefs' Association
of America.

Ald. Saunders was honored by the
convention, being made an honorary
member, as was also Chairman Flem-
ing, of the fire and water committee,
Toronto.

In Duluth Ald. Saunders and the fire
chief saw much of things which will
be of use to the fire brigade, and
they feel that the money and time
spent by them will be found to be
money and time well spent. There
were over 200 delegates in attendance
and tests of the best fire-fighting ap-
paratus in the world were held daily.

All that is new in the fire-fighting line,
the Londoners saw in Duluth. Both
gentlemen also visited St. Paul, Minne-
apolis and Chicago, and they made
notes of the things that impressed
them in the ordinances and discipline
of the brigades in those cities.

"Everywhere we found a scarcity of
good men for fire chiefs," said the
Advertiser today. "Times are so
good, and it is so easy to get work
done, that it is very difficult to find
very difficult to secure men who are
ready to undergo the discipline of a
fire fighter, to say nothing of the
physical and mental endurance."

One of the most important of the
demonstrations held at Duluth was for
the purpose of showing that in a fire
situation a special demonstration
given by the fire fighters of that
city for the benefit of the visitors.
