

QUEBEC PREMIER IS EXONERATED

The Legislative Committee Says Senatorial Charges of Corruption Are False.

Quebec, March 14.—The prolonged struggle between Premier Parent and those who want to force him out of office, is evidently now entering upon its final phase, and his retirement in a few days is confidently looked for.

Last night his principal assailants, Senators Legris and Choquette, entirely ignored the committee of inquiry appointed to investigate the charges which they have been making against him through the press. Although duly notified of the matter, they did not appear, their failure to do so being founded, it is said, on objection to making charges to be investigated by a committee under the Premier's control and before which only such witnesses and records as he pleased would be brought. The committee, however, has declined the Premier's jurisdiction, preferring to leave the decision of their cases against Mr. Parent to the House, which was the tribunal chosen by himself in the first instance. After a long wrangle, the chairman ruled that the documents should be accepted for the time being, and then the room was cleared, and the committee sat for half an hour with closed doors, when it adjourned until this morning, to meet again to prepare its report to the House. This report, it is thought, will be the prelude to Mr. Parent's resignation as leader of the Government. It is said to be very probable, also, that he will resign as mayor of the city, when he will go south for the benefit of his health.

Pursuant to last night's adjournment, the committee of inquiry into the Parent matter met again this morning, and after a deliberation of about an hour and a half with closed doors, adopted with only one dissenting voice (Teller of Joliette) a report which was made to the House this afternoon, declaring, first, that the accusations made by Senators Legris and Choquette against the Premier, as contained in Mr. Leblanc's declarations, are false; second, that the administration of the Premier has been conducted with integrity and honesty, and that no act of favor or partiality has been committed in conducting the committee. They express regret that Senators Legris and Choquette did not see fit to attend the committee, and the position taken by them before the public, especially in view of the facilities they were offered to bring up their proof if they had.

Commission at St. Thomas.

Wickert, harrister, this city, represented the township of Yarmouth; Mr. Torrance, harrister, of Toronto; the C. S. R., and W. B. Doherty, city solicitor, the city of St. Thomas.

THE DEE MURDER CASE

Trial Adjourned While Inquiry Is Made as to Sanity.

Woodstock, March 14.—The Dee murder trial was resumed this forenoon. Before any evidence was submitted, Mr. T. Blackstock, K.C., in behalf of Mrs. Dee, entered a plea of not guilty. He intimated that the plea of the defense would be that Mrs. Dee was insane. Moreover, he held that the accused was now insane, and therefore not in a fit condition to stand her trial. He asserted that two asylum doctors were prepared to declare her insane, and he asked an adjournment of the trial until this afternoon, that this evidence might be submitted.

His application was granted. Mrs. Dee maintained a stolid indifference to the proceedings, and gave many evidences of an unsound mind.

PARIS "POSTPONES" NEW RUSS LOAN

Issuance at Present Forbidden by French Government.

ACT MAY FORCE CZAR TO PEACE

The Japanese Likely to Demand an Indemnity of \$500,000,000 to \$750,000,000.

Paris, March 14.—Inquiry today at three banks, principally interested in the proposed new Russian loan, brought the response that it had been decided to postpone the issue. A representative of one of the banks said the postponement for such an indefinite period meant that it was not likely the issuance would occur for some time to come.

The postponement was attributed to the uncertainties of the war situation. The Temps says: "It was quite natural that the Paris bankers should refuse to sign a contract in view of the conditions in Manchuria and the entire ignorance of the financiers concerning the real intentions of the Russian Government." The paper declares the postponement will continue until Russia's intentions become clear.

The Journal des Debats, in its financial article, says: "Many people consider the adjournment to be evidence that Russia has reached the end of her resources." London, March 15.—The Daily Mail declares that the French Government has given Parisian banking houses clearly to understand that they must not conclude the proposed Russian loan unless the Russian government is prepared to negotiate for peace. This revolt of the French bankers is considered by the London newspapers as the most hopeful and important news of the day, promising an early conclusion of peace between Russia and Japan. Apparently the proposed loan has not been absolutely refused, but only "postponed." This, however, is regarded here as being tantamount to refusal.

It is expected to speak loudly for Russian war party even then General Kuropatkin's reverse at Mukden. It is the general belief that by the death of M. Gorkhovsky, Russia lost her strongest financial friend in France, and that had he been alive no difficulty would have been experienced. With the English and American markets closed to her, it is thought that Russia can only turn to Germany, who is not likely to be much more responsive than France, and the only alternative would seem to be to make peace.

Reports are current here that Japan will demand an indemnity of between \$500,000,000 and \$750,000,000.

PACKING APPLES FOR EXPORTATION

Resolution to Substitute Boxes for Barrels Passes in Committee.

Ottawa, March 14.—When in committee today the House took up the Minister of Agriculture's resolution as to uniformity in the size of boxes used for the exportation of apples. The resolution is as follows: "When apples are packed in Canada for export for sale by the box they shall be packed in good and strong boxes of seasoned wood, the inside dimensions of which shall not be less than 10 inches in depth, 21 inches in width and 20 inches in length, representing as near as possible 2,200 cubic inches. Every person who, for export, offers or exposes for sale or who packs applies by the box otherwise than in accordance with the foregoing provisions of this section, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty of 25 cents for each box of apples so offered or exposed for sale or packed. When apples are packed in boxes or barrels having trays or fillers, wherein it is intended to have a separate compartment for each apple, the provisions of these sections shall not apply."

Mr. Monk spoke of the apple-growing industry in Ontario, and mentioned the case of R. W. Sheppard, who, last year, realized \$5 to \$7 per barrel on apples properly packed in boxes, while other growers got only a dollar a barrel, which price, after deducting cost of barrel and transportation, left a very small margin to the grower.

Mr. Fisher explained that the legal box would contain a bushel of apples, or about 40 pounds in weight. He added some explanations of the bill. The only change which has been made in the resolution is one providing that uniformity in the size of boxes shall only be required for the export trade. Mr. Fisher said many apple growers were in favor of uniform boxes for the internal as well as for export trade, but it had been decided to take one step at a time.

There was very little hostile criticism of the general principle of the resolution, but objection was taken to some of its details. Mr. Henderson (Halton) favored a smaller box than that provided for in the regulation. He suggested also that the regulation should not come into force until the fall of 1906. Claude Macdonnell (Toronto) said he had consulted the apple exporters of that city, and their opinion was against a hard-and-fast definition of the size of boxes for the export trade. A smaller as well as a larger-sized box should be permitted in order to give the Canadian grower an opportunity to cater to different markets. The French market required a small box, while the Liverpool trade preferred barrels. Mr. Macdonnell suggested that the resolution should stand till a Dominion convention could be held.

Mr. Armstrong urged that some statutory provision should be made for proper care and storage for fruit on trans-Atlantic steamers.

Mr. Jackson (Elgin), while he favored a standard package for the export trade, observed that it would likely sell apples to the minister by the standard box, as he was sure one couldn't get a barrel of apples in three of the boxes of the Vegetable Pils. Mr. R. L. Borden submitted for the consideration of the minister a letter in which the suggestion was made that the size of the box should be fixed by 12 by 24, which would give a box of 2,200 cubic inches.

The Minister of Agriculture said the box proposed in the bill was of common size, and was of the same dimensions without fractions, and was only 18 inches short of the imperial bushel.

The resolution was then adopted and the bill founded upon it being introduced and read a first time.

LEGISLATION RE PHONE COMPANIES

Committee Will Be Appointed to Investigate the Various System.

Ottawa, March 14.—By way of variation the Minister of Agriculture today presented two petitions asking that in granting autonomy to the Northwest Territories, a clause be inserted prohibiting the manufacture, importation and sale of intoxicating liquors.

There were a number of petitions against the school clause of the measure as it now stands.

On motion to go into supply, Mr. Borden asked if the Government intended to introduce an amendment to the bank test, to provide for closer Government inspection.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier replied that the subject had not been considered by the Finance Minister, and for himself he thought the Canadian bankage system about as near perfection as could be.

Mr. Foster asked when an announcement might be expected as to the date of the budget.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier suggested that the question be renewed on Thursday, when Mr. Fielding would be in the House, and when a definite answer might be given.
