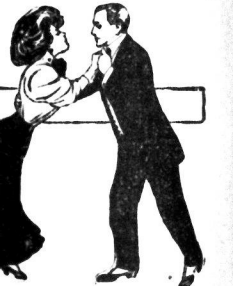

NE TEMERE DECREE

The right of regulating the sacrament of marriage for the communicants. So long as we refuse to recognize as valid the marriage of divorcees which the civil law permits, then we cannot consistently oppose the ne temere decree. An entirely wrong application has been given to it on account of our hatred for the Roman Catholic Church, let us remove first the beams out of our own eyes.

A Different Opinion. Canon Scott, of Montreal, declared that it would be a matter of lasting regret to bring in the action of the ne temere decree. He said that the ne temere decree was a matter of lasting regret to bring in the action of the ne temere decree.

No New Legislation. "We don't want any new legislation," he said, "until we have a decision from the highest authority in this country on the question. The ne temere decree is a strong one, however, and I would advise appealing it. But I hope that a private council will be taken before the ne temere decree is put into effect."

A Joint Committee. The motion of Mr. Blake, which had been upon Monday's discussion, was voted upon by the house, and carried with a strong majority. The motion provided for a joint committee of both houses of the synod to be appointed to go fully into the whole matter of the ne temere decree, and to take whatever action they might deem necessary to the preservation and stability of marriage in Canada.

A Careful Course. Canon Kittson advised a careful course, on the ground that the members of the synod knew very little regarding the actual facts of the whole thing. "I have every reason to appreciate the religion of the Church of Rome. I have the deepest respect for the Roman Catholics as such, and for the French-Canadians also. But let us remember that there are powers behind the throne, powers that are political and dangerous powers. The Roman Catholic Church must not go beyond its own people in the matter of the ne temere decree."

The Council of Trent. The Council of Trent had provided that the members of the church should be married by proper priests on pain of nullity. The Roman Catholic Church was infringing on the rights of the Dominion Parliament. The church has made a claim that if we recognize the claim, it will demand the right of the law in the Province of Ontario. It is clear and simple in Quebec, unless you read into it the decrees of the Council of Trent. I am not advising marriage. It is a dangerous thing. But let us demand that we be least free in regard to the law of marriage. There has been some attempt in Quebec to deprive us of our freedom in regard to the validity of our marriages, and the legitimacy of our children."

Multitasking to Protestants. Canon Patterson-Smith said: "Let no one outside of the synod get the impression that we are dangerous to the Protestants. It is humiliating to Protestants."
