## STEEL MEN ASK FOR HIGHER TARIFF

Ottawa, Oct. 25.—A delegation representing the steel manufacturers of Canada, had a conference this morning with Finance Minister White, and urged him to give more protection to the steel industries of Canada. They pointed out that steel makers are now getting less aid than during the time of the late Government, when bounties were paid. The bounty plan has run

its course, and the steel makers want its place taken by a schedule of tariffs higher than there is in force at present.

Hon. Mr. White stated that the request would receive the serious consideration of the Government.

## LIBERAL CANDIDATE WINS IN RICHELIEU

Mr. Cardin Carries the By-Election With a Majority of 301 After Campaign Along Several Lines.

Montreal, Oct. 24.—The by-election in Richelieu today resulted in a Liberal victory. Mr. P. J. A. Cardin, winning from Mr. E. A. D. Morgan by a majority of 301. It was the first by-election in Quebec since the defeat of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in the general elections, and the success was the cause of much elation among Sir Wilfrid's followers tonight.

This morning by districts were Cardin—Sorel, 2648; St. Joseph, 43; St. Our, 48; St. Robert, 67; St. Louis, 47; St. Alme, 48; St. Marlet, 14. Morgan—St. Victoire, 148; St. Anne, 52; St. Pierre, 25; St. Roch, 5. The chief Conservative gain was in Sorel, where the Government shipyards are located. At the general elections Mr. Cardin's majority there was 532, against 264 today.

## FEW LOADS OF HAY BROUGHT TO MARKET

Price Came Down Because of Fodder's Wet Condition.

The only offering on the local market today were a few loads of hay, which sold at slightly lower prices than loads of the same quality offered Saturday on account of their rather wet condition. The prices ranged from \$14 to \$16.50 per ton.

The market tomorrow is expected to be larger than any of the past two weeks on account of Monday being a holiday. It is likely that there will be large offerings of rough hay also.

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—Further weakness was shown by today's stock market, the result, in all probability, of money conditions. Local banks had lent over \$11,000,000 to the interior, chiefly through the sub-treasury, which makes probable a deficit in the reserve tomorrow. Money opened at 5½ per cent, its highest initial rate in some days. Steel was successful of the active stocks, selling under 75, its lowest price in over a month. Reading, Lehigh Valley, Union Pacific, Canadian Pacific and several copper and industrial stocks of speculative importance sold at a point or more. Liquidation was most active in the second hour, when money went to 6½ per cent. Bonds were easy.

PARIS, Oct. 25.—There was a partial reaction at the opening of the bourse today, but later prices advanced and closed firm. Three per cent bonds, 90 francs, 45 centimes, for the account. Exchange on London, 25 francs 25½ centimes for checks. Private discount rate, 3 to 4½ per cent.

## PREPARING TO DECLARE WAR ON KENT COUNTY

London Troops Will Penetrate Morasses in the Vicinity of Cedar Springs

The commanders of the Red and Blue forces, which will take part in the sham battle along Lake Erie, south of Chatham, on Thanksgiving Day, are still at work on the details of the program, and it is expected that the demonstration will provide one of the finest displays of military tactics possible outside of real action.

The battle field has been laid out in Kent County along the lake shore, and while the naval portion of the demonstration must be assumed, the land fight will have every touch of realism. The militia officers decided upon this location, following the practice in England, as a great many of the British possessions are on water.

## MR. FOSTER PLANS

Will Spend Winter With the Trade Commission in Australia.

Ottawa, Oct. 24.—Parliament is not going to see much of the Hon. George Foster this session. His present plan is to spend the winter with the Imperial trade commission in Australia and New Zealand. This commission sails from England for Australia on Jan. 15, and they will not return until July. There is some talk in Conservative circles of putting pressure on Hon. Mr. Foster to compel him to abandon or curtail his trip and remain in Ottawa for the struggle which is expected to take place. It is understood, however, that Hon. Mr. Foster is quite determined to go. He may be summoned to Canada by cable if the Government finds the going in the House too heavy.
