

TWO LIVES LOST, MANY INJURED BY WRECK IN WEST

Engine Crew of C. P. R. Train
Perish When Cars
Pile Up.

ENGINE CAREENED AND ROLLED OVER

Entire Train Turned Turtle and
Eight Passengers Were
Seriously Hurt.

Medicine Hat, Alta., Nov. 25.—The early morning crowd train, due in Medicine Hat at 4:30 o'clock from Kootenay Landing, piled in a heap about 2:30 a.m. at Fitzgerald, a small crossing between Seven Persons and Gull's Head. Two engines lost their lives and some 17 people were more or less seriously injured. Two or three of the injured are seriously hurt; one will likely die.

Engineer James Cain, a veteran at the throttle, lay under the firebox at his engine. He suffered a terrible death as did also his fireman, H. H. Flower. When it struck the switch the engine careened and rolled completely over, the train broke loose and the baggage, express, mail car and coaches left the track and rolled over. Engineer Cain's head was badly cut, but he evidently died as the result of escaping steam from the broken and twisted engine boiler. When the rescuers found him he was dead.

Fireman Flower, of Calgary, died like his chief, at his post, and in the same manner, only that there is not a mark of any kind on his body other than the scalds.

Of the eight injured, who were taken to the hospital on the arrival here of the rescue train, one, George Downing, a carpenter of this town, will likely die. He is in a precarious condition. The others are seriously hurt, and it will be a few days before it is known what the outcome will be.

C. P. R.'s Statement.
At the C. P. R. offices this evening the following official statement was issued:

"Herewith is a list of persons killed and injured at the wreck of train No. 614 this morning at Fitzgerald:
"J. Cain, engineer, scalded to death.
"H. H. Flower, fireman, scalded to death.

"Injured—William Smith, passenger, Lethbridge, forehead cut; Geo. Downing, car repairer, Medicine Hat, right leg badly crushed, amputation necessary; William Cross, passenger, Lethbridge, right ear cut, shoulder bruised; George Russell, passenger, Keeler, Sask., hand cut; Henry Hendrickson, passenger, Finland, three scalp wounds; Joseph Vynnyk, passenger, Saskatoon, Sask., abdomen injured, not seriously; Abraham Douglas, passenger, Kipp, Alta., scalp wound, five inches long, left shoulder severely injured; Martin Edvardson, passenger, Seven Persons, right arm broken in two places, right shoulder cut and bruised.

"All the above were taken to the Medicine Hat Hospital and attended to. Those able to do so returned to their homes.

"So far the investigation shows that the accident was due to the excessive speed of the train when passing over the west switch at Fitzgerald."

TILBURY CHILD WAS FATALLY BURNED

Playing With Lighted Paper in Front
of the Stove.

Tilbury, Nov. 25.—Four-year-old Fennel Chambers was so horribly burned this afternoon at the home of her mother, Mrs. Robert Chambers, a widow, that she cannot recover.

The little girl and her two small brothers were left alone for a short time. They began fighting paper in the front of a stove. The little girl's clothing became ignited, and she and the other two children ran out of the house. Ernest Chauvin, a passerby, heard the children screaming and hastened to them. When he reached the little girl every shred of clothing except her shoes and stockings was burned from the body, and his hands were burned by carrying the child in to the house.

DROPPED DEAD

Isaac Sutton Stricken While on Visit
With His Son.

WANT \$30,000

Woodstock Council Plans Big Im-
provements to Schools.

PREMIER PETULANT UNDER CRITICISM

Disliked Hon. Mr. Oliver's Ar-
raignment of Conservative
Election Methods.

WARNS THE GOVERNMENT

Resents the Sneers at Presbyterian
Body Made by Members of the
Government.

Ottawa, Nov. 26.—At the close of last night's sitting of the Commons, when during the debate on the speech from the throne the Hon. Mr. Oliver was sending hot shot into the Government over the western by-election scandals, the Premier, who was evidently much annoyed, cried "Enough." The Edmonton man had read the House the various affidavits in the case of Magistrate McKinnon, and his reprehensible conduct, and passed on to say that the whole circumstance had occasioned much comment beyond the pale of politics. He drew attention to the action of the Presbyterian Synod of Brandon, when the Conservatives, headed by Dr. Schaffner, Mr. White and Mr. Marshall, broke into laughter.

Resents the Sneers.
Mr. Oliver resented the sneer at the mention of the Presbyterian Church. "Whatever you may say against that religious body," said he, "the Presbyterian body has always stood for human liberty and free speech." He proceeded to arraign the Government of Manitoba, when Premier Borden jumped to his feet with an appeal to the Speaker.

Hon. Mr. Oliver, the Premier declared, was out of order. He had no business to discuss the "detestable" of provincial administrations over which we have no jurisdiction whatever. Speaker Sproule stated that much latitude was allowed, but he thought the honorable member was "wandering far from the subject."

Mr. Oliver maintained that he was within the rules, but had no objection to stopping if the Premier found it distasteful.

Mr. Borden replied warmly that he had no objection to anything that related to any matter over which the Government and the House had control, but protested against any comment on matters of provincial jurisdiction over which the House had no control.

"It interfered directly with the election of a member to this House," commented Mr. Oliver.

"The member must stay within the bounds of order," declared the Premier sharply.

"He does not like it," quoth Mr. McNutt amid Liberal laughter.

The Coon Comes Down.
"I intend to show," continued Mr. Oliver, "that the revenues of Manitoba have been used for the purpose of maintaining a strong arm of election thugs, detectives, magistrates, scrupulous and others. And I propose to open up the discussion of the administration of justice in Saskatchewan in connection with this same matter and the interference of the Government in the provincial election of Saskatchewan."

"The honorable member is quite at liberty to go ahead," quoth Mr. Borden, tartly.

"The coon came down quickly," put in Mr. Tobin.

Mr. Borden said his point of order was the bringing in of matters entirely within the jurisdiction of the provincial administration.

Mr. MacDonald rose to a point of order. The Premier, said he, had now tried to make four speeches on his point of order. (Liberal laughter.)

Mr. Oliver warned the Premier that he would find another opportunity to bring these matters to the attention of the House. "I propose to show," said he, "the improper interference of this Government in the cause of justice in Manitoba and in the conduct of elections in Saskatchewan. It has been the most gross travesty of British constitutional ethics and a villainous denial of the right of free speech to which the colleagues of the Prime Minister have been directly a part. He and his Government stand to benefit by these things, and he and his whole Government must take the full responsibility for that condition of affairs."

Mr. Oliver sat down amid prolonged Liberal cheering and Conservative howling, and Hon. Mr. White moved the adjournment of the debate.
