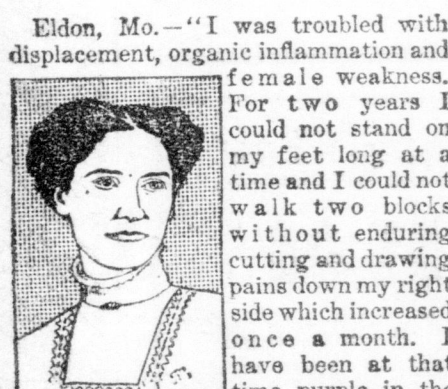

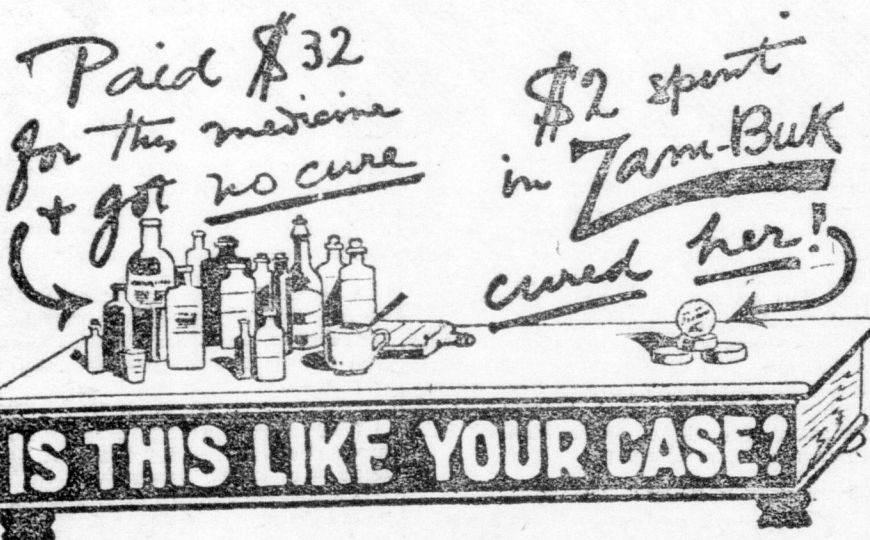

## BIG CHANGES IN BORDEN CABINET COMING SHORTLY

Three Ministers Are to Retire According to Rumors at Ottawa.

### NEW DEPT. IS PLANNED

Hon. Louis Coderre and Hon. T. W. Crothers To Be Made Judges.

Ottawa, Oct. 14.—There are many rumors abroad regarding important Government changes that are to take place shortly. It has been understood for some time that Premier Borden intends to get rid of some of the weak brethren in his cabinet at the earliest opportunity, and to bring in at least four new ministers, with a view to strengthening the ministry, especially in regard to debating talent in the Commons and in platform oratory for the stump, in which the cabinet is now admittedly weak.

### Three to Retire.

The ministers slated for retirement are: Hon. Bruno Nantel, minister of inland revenue; Hon. Louis Coderre, secretary of state and minister of mines; and Hon. T. W. Crothers, minister of labor.

Hon. Mr. Nantel is to be appointed to the railway commission in place of Hon. J. E. Bernier, whose ten-year term of appointment expires next February. Hon. Louis Coderre is to take a Quebec judgeship, as was the original plan when he entered the ministry temporarily instead of Mr. L. T. Marchal, K. C., of Montreal. Mr. Crothers is to be appointed to the post of minister of the interior, in place of Mr. R. B. Bennett, M. P. for Calgary, orator, industrialist and statesman, is to be brought in to succeed Dr. Roche as minister of the interior. That will also give Alberta a representative in the cabinet.

It may be that these changes will be delayed until after the coming session of Parliament, but there is good authority for stating that they are now contemplated by Premier Borden.

### Another Resignation?

Montreal, Oct. 12.—Conservative circles announce that the electors of the counties of Terrebonne and Hochelaga will be called to make the choice of a new candidate to represent them at Ottawa. Hon. W. B. Nantel, minister of revenue and interior, and deputy for Terrebonne since 1908, will, it is said, resign his office, and will be appointed as member on the railway commission to replace Hon. M. E. Bernier, or he may be made a judge. Hon. Louis Coderre, M. P. for Hochelaga, it is understood, will also be made a judge.

It is probable that Hon. T. Chase Casgrain, K. C., will be a candidate in Terrebonne for the Government, and L. T. Marchal, K. C., will be candidate in Hochelaga.

## THINK SPONTANEOUS COMBUSTION CAUSED FIRE ON STR. VOLTURNO

Chemicals in the Hold Got mixed Is Latest Theory—Wild Story in Liverpool That Bomb Was Placed on Boat By Agents of Rival Company.

On Board the Kroonland, By Wire.—Spontaneous combustion through the mingling of the chemicals which formed a part of the cargo of the Volturmo is the explanation given by the survivors from the burning vessel, who are now being conveyed to New York by the Kroonland for the explosion which it is believed started the disastrous fire on the Uranium liner, which was responsible for the loss of so many lives last Thursday and Friday.

### Has 89 Survivors.

The Kroonland has on board 89 persons who escaped from the flames in mid-Atlantic, including Captain Inch and the wireless operators.

The boxes containing chemicals, the Volturmo passengers believe, were smashed open by the rolling of the vessel, and their contents exploded when mixed.

The survivors say that nobody was left alive on the Volturmo. Captain Inch, though wounded, and weak from loss of sleep, refusing to forsake the ship until convinced that he was absolutely the last person capable of leaving it.

### Plucky Operators.

They also praise the heroic work of the wireless operators, W. Seddon and C. H. Pennington, who stuck courageously to their duty, even though their cabin was unbearably hot, for hours before they were finally compelled to leave it, when the very floor began to warp beneath them. When the last despairing message was sent out by them for help, the roar of the flames mingled with the crackle of the electric current, as it escaped from the wires.

Most of the survivors were without sleep for 20 hours and are still in an exhausted and nervous condition as a result of their harrowing experiences.

### Boats Overturned.

Eye-witnesses of the launching of the boats on the Volturmo say that the little craft containing cabin passengers was spilled the moment it touched the water, a big wave easily overturning it.

Another boat, which contained steerage passengers, was dashed against the side of the Volturmo and broken up, all its occupants perishing.

### MANY ON LA TOURNAINE.

Paris, Oct. 14.—The Volturmo disas-

ter as viewed by those aboard the French Line steamer La Touraine was reported roughly by wireless as La Touraine approached Havre today with 42 survivors reported on board.

A wireless message from the captain of the La Touraine said: "We reached the Volturmo at 10:30 o'clock at night. Wind and sea had fallen to some extent, but it was extremely dangerous to launch boats. We sent out two light whaleboats and one larger boat. Both officers and men showed great zeal, but the sea was too heavy to manoeuvre the boats, and the difficulties encountered were great.

Cries of Distress.  
"The Volturmo was on fire forward, and the passengers were grouped in the stern. The cries of distress were maddening. We held to approach at the stern. The vessel was rolling and heaving very much with her propeller out of the water. The rescue boats risked being crushed against the ship or invaded by passengers and overcrowded.

"At 3:30 a.m. the sea was still very rough, and we were obliged to take in our boats. One apparently after the rescue of 42 passengers had been effected. At 5 a.m. the boats were put out again. The sea was dangerous, but it was then daylight. The other vessels, however, signalled that no one was left on board the Volturmo."

LOST ITS RUDDER.

London, Oct. 14.—Mrs. Chas. Finch, of Joliet, a passenger on the steamer Carmania, who witnessed the rescue of some of the passengers of the burning steamship Volturmo, declares that one of the lifeboats sent from the freighter Seydlitz lost its rudder on the way to the distressed steamer and capsized, eight men of the crew being drowned.

Mrs. Finch kept a diary of notes on the disaster, and has the loss of the Seydlitz lifeboat as one of her entries.

WILD RUMOR.  
Liverpool, Oct. 12.—There is a rumor in Liverpool, which is unbelievable, to the effect that the destruction of the steamship Volturmo was the result of a deliberate plot to defeat the ship. This is said to be the belief of the owners of the Uranium Line, who ascribe it to the attempts of the German and Dutch consular officials to keep up the continental business of the company.

## DARRAGH SENT FOR TRIAL ON MANSLAUGHTER CHARGE

Held For Causing Death of Charles Jones, Who Went Overboard During Drunken Spree Near Warton—Bail Granted—Accused Feels His Position Keenly.

Warton, Oct. 13.—Emerson Darragh was committed for trial this afternoon when he appeared before Magistrate Miller for a preliminary hearing in connection with the death of Charles Jones on Oct. 6, Darragh will be tried at the next assizes in Owen Sound on a charge of having caused Jones' death by throwing him overboard.

Jones, it appears, was the only man sober on board the fishing boat. The whole case centres around the fact that Jones, a fisherman, was steering all over the lake. He could not hear any noise, the sound of the engine preventing that. He saw Darragh, however, lift his left hand and give Jones a shove.

Haskell, who was at the engine, could not see what occurred at the time, but heard loud talking about the steering. Fanning shouted to Haskell that Darragh had thrown Jones overboard. Darragh got up, looked around, and told Haskell to go a little farther and then turn the boat around, which was done. All they could find, however, was the hat of Jones. They then returned to Warton and reported to the chief of police the drowning of Jones.

Had No Quarrel.  
All the evidence goes to show that there was no quarrel among them, that there was no motive for the deed, but that it was the sad ending of a drunken spree. Haskell maintained that Jones was drunk, but that he was very careful in the boat. He last saw him in a hunched position, with his feet upon two planks and his back against the comb of the boat.

Manslaughter Charge.  
The defence did not put up any case. The crown attorney said the charge was manslaughter, and in justice to the public and to the relatives the accused should be committed for trial. Had Jones not been shoved he would not have fallen overboard.

A. W. Wright, barrister, of Owen Sound, who represented the accused, said that there was no motive for any act or quarrel. It was all the result of intoxication and only an accident, and asked that the prisoner be discharged. The magistrate, however, committed the accused to stand bail at the fall assizes in Owen Sound and granted bail.

The prince and his bride-elect both passed a very busy day, and in the morning Prince Arthur received at Clarence House a wedding present consisting of a silver service from the United Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of St. England.

## MOVING FILMS FOUND CHILD AND ABDUCTOR

Tokio, Oct. 13.—John Ellis, the business manager of the Japan Advertiser, wanted in Boston for the abduction of his daughter and for contempt of court, was arrested today on a charge of perjury, as abduction is not extraditable in Japan.

A search for Ellis was made in this city, a story of the abduction with which he is charged being published in The Advertiser at the time. Ellis is a sort of "jack of all trades," having been a clergyman, a telegraph operator, a broker and a newspaper man.

When he and his wife separated custody of their daughter was awarded to the wife. Some time later Ellis abducted the girl, and then the wife began a world-wide search for her, appearing to the newspapers of every city in the world, and also to the women's associations. Mrs. May R. Thornley, of the W. C. T. U., received a communication from the woman in Boston inclosing pictures of Ellis and his daughter, and an appeal to her to aid in the search for the pair. Ellis disappeared with the child a year ago, but Mrs. Ellis sent pictures of the couple to moving picture film companies, and in that way located the pair.
