butcher hides, flat, 14c to 14½c per lb. Inspected hides, No. 1, 12½c; No. 2, 12½c. Country hides, flat, cured, 13½c to 14½c. Part cured, 13c to 13½c.

Calfskins—City skins, green, flat, 16½c. Country, cured, 17½c to 19c; part cured, 17c, according to condition and take-off. Deacons or bob calf, \$1 to \$1.50.

Horsehides—City take-off, \$3.50 to \$4. Country take-off, No. 1, \$3.50 to \$4; No. 2, \$2.50 to \$3.50.

Sheepskins—City lambskins, pelts or shearings, 50c to 55c. Country lambskins or shearings, 30c to 55c.

Wool—Trade is quiet. Washed combing fleece (coarse), 25c to 25½c. Washed clothing fleece (fine), 25½c to 27c. Washed selections (burry, chaffy, etc.), 19c to 19½c. Unwashed fleece combing (coarse), 16c to 16½c. Unwashed fleece clothing (fine), 17½c to 17c.

Wool—City rendered sold in barrels, 6c to 6½c. Country stock, sold in barrels, No. 1, 6c to 6½c; No. 2, 5½c to 6c. Calf, No. 1, 6½c to 6½c; No. 2, 5½c to 6c.

Horsehair—Farmer paddlers' stock, 37c to 40c.

TORONTO, Oct. 29.—Potatoes—The market is unchanged. Ontario, 80c per bag, on track, and New Brunswick, 90c per bag, on track.

TORONTO, Oct. 29.—Butter—The local market is quiet. The demand, however, is good for choice qualities, which are plentiful. Inferior grades are in good supply. Choice dairy, 22c to 24c; inferior, 20c to 21c; creamery, 20c to 21c; for rolls, 20c to 21c. Choice for solids, 18c to 19c. Receipts are small. Case lots of new-laid, 23c to 24c per doz; fresh, 22c to 23c; and storage, 20c to 21c per doz. Cheese—New cheese quoted at 14½c for large and 14½c to 15c for twins.

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UNIONISTS WOULD FIGHT FOR ULSTER SAYS BONAR LAW

General Election Is Best Way, Though, To Settle the Question.

GET PEOPLE'S MANDATE

Sir Edward Carson Declares All Overtures Will Be Considered.

Newcastle, England, Oct. 30.—Speaking from the same platform as Sir Edward Carson, the Ulster Unionist leader, Andrew Bonar Law, the Opposition leader in the House of Commons, last night pledged the support of the Unionist party to Ulster even to the extent of forcible resistance to home rule.

But his eagerly-awaited reply to Premier Asquith's offer of a compromise on Oct. 25 consisted merely of a statement that the Unionists would carefully consider any proposals the Prime Minister cared to make relative to a solution of the home rule problem, if a solution were possible.

Secure a Mandate. Mr. Law expressed the opinion that the only logical way the Government could avoid the responsibility of plunging the country into civil war was to secure a mandate from the people by a general election, which, if it favored home rule, would be acquiesced in by the Unionists.

He said he could not speak for Ulster, but believed that such a result might even settle the question there.

The Unionist leader compared the situation in Ulster to conditions in America preceding the civil war. He said he had urged Sir Edward Carson to attend the meeting so that the people which he (Law) had made at the Balmoral Palace in July, 1912, to support Ulster in his resistance to home rule might be made perfectly clear.

Confusing Issue. The speaker maintained that the Government had brought forward its land proposals in order to confuse the issue. If the Government refused to go to the country the Unionist leaders would not decline the invitation to a conference, and would probably consider any proposals made to them and answer them with a real desire to find a solution.

Sir Edward Carson, who followed Mr. Law, said: "I will consider all the overtures when they are put into plain language. I will submit them with the best advice I can give. But I tell the Government that, so far as I am concerned, an offer will be of no use unless it is consistent with the solemn compact which the Government has driven into Ulster."

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
