NEWS

Has Nothing to Say.—Asked for another opinion, this morning, on the necessity of a ball park switch, in order that an interrupted West London car service could be given while ball games were in progress at Tecumseh Park, Manager C. B. King, of the street railway, declared that he has nothing further to say.

Going to S. A. Congress.—Bandmen E. Hancock, of Nuyper One Corps Band, Salvation Army, leaves London tomorrow for a trip to England where he will attend the International S. A. Congress, returning to this city in about eight weeks. Bandmen Hancock is a son of Envoys and Mrs. Hancock, 138 Horton street.

Attend Silver Wedding.—A number of London friends of Mr. and Mrs. F. J. Waddell, Balclutha street, St. Thomas attended the silver wedding surprise party given last week. A silver cabinet and an address were presented to the St. Thomas young couple.

Joint Mock Trial.—Under the joint auspices of the British Social Union and the London Liberal Club a mock trial will be held in Hyman Hall on Friday evening. An invitation to the public to attend is being extended, and an interesting entertainment is promised by the committee in charge.

Start Horton Street Pavement.—Street railway construction gangs yesterday started on the work of laying new rails and paving the street railway allowance on Horton street between Talbot and Ridout. The work will be finished within a month, according to statements made by Manager C. B. King, of the street railway.

Putting on Night Goggles.—In order that the big concrete walls for the new addition to the Hydro power station, Horton and Ridout streets, can be put in at one time, to avoid joints in the cement, night gangs will be put on. Lights were strung by the city electric department this morning and continuous work on the cement walls will be started at once.

M. O. H. Convention Good One.—Dr. H. W. Hill, director of the local Institute of Public Health, returned yesterday from Toronto where he had been in attendance in the convention of the Ontario Medical Officers of Health. "There was a lot of splendid information secured at the convention and it was a good one in every respect," said Dr. Hill this morning. The doctor, who was one of the speakers, was the only London representative.

Friends' General Meeting.—A general meeting of the Canadian Order of Chosen Friends was held at Council No. 75 Monday evening. All the city councils were represented. Friend James Boddy, of the postoffice department, Toronto, and past grand representative, made an eloquent appeal on behalf of the order, showing the good done in charity in the past. Short addresses were also given by Friends M. Smith, recorder, 25; George B. Nash, 125; W. J. Cook, 27; Friend Pring, 230, and W. G. Murray, chief councillor, 75. The balance of the evening was spent in social.

Arrest Alleged Bike Thief.—Because James Ramsay sold a bicycle yesterday under what looked like suspicious circumstances to Detectives Egleton and Dowd, they made investigation, and Ramsay is now in jail, arrested for the theft of a bicycle. The machine is the property of Allison Welsh, a clerk at the Grand Trunk station. He left the rear of the station in the morning, and when he left work at noon, it had disappeared. The police department has not yet been notified by Welsh, but made the arrest "on their own," early this morning.

Street Lights Cheaper Here.—General Manager H. J. Glauzitz of the public utilities commission, who has just returned from New York and Boston, reports an interesting street lighting fight in the Boston common council. According to Mr. Glauzitz, the Boston Gas Co., is charging \$23 per annum for 60 candle power lights. This is regarded as too expensive by the Boston council. In London, says Mr. Glauzitz, the price for street lights is average \$11.50 per annum, and can be reduced by a measurement, as against the \$23 Boston figure for 60 c. p., which is laboratory measurement, and no actual measurement.

RESIST STATEMENT OF "UNDESIRABLES"
Former London Teachers on University Schools Staff Protest Against Declaration.

Three teachers of the University Schools of Toronto, all of the former teachers in the Collegiate Institute in this city, take very decided exception to the statement of Principal Rogers to the Collegiate to the effect that "in the university schools in Toronto, where the fee is, I believe, \$60 a year, they have the greatest number of undesirables in the province."

The statement appeared in The Advertiser recently and was taken by the university school teachers at Toronto. The following letter received today contains their reply to Mr. Rogers:

Our attention has been called to an article, which appeared recently in your paper, giving an account of the proceedings of the board of education, in the course of which the question of fees at the Collegiate Institute was discussed. In this report Mr. Gunn is said to have stated that a number of pupils, which brought the reply from the principal that real undesirables were usually those who were unable to pay. "In the university schools in Toronto, where the fee is, I believe, \$60 a year, they have the greatest number of undesirables in the province," said Mr. Rogers.

We sincerely hope that Mr. Rogers has been misreported, as we do not like to think that he would wish to do harm to a sister institution to his own.

In any case, we the undersigned teachers of the university schools, who were also for years on the staff of the London Collegiate Institute, wish to state most emphatically that the remark of Mr. Rogers, is to the best of our knowledge, absolutely without foundation on fact. Further, we would add, as the result of our experience in both positions, that we consider the boys of the university schools to be, not only for zeal in study and in ability, but also in the many qualities of courtesy, uprightness and honor, the equals, if not the superiors of any pupils that have come under our instruction.

In justice to the boys and to their parents, we enter this protest against any such opinion as that reported.
