Hard on Vagrants.—Evidently Magistrate Elhu Burnett Smith, of Ailsa Craig, does not approve of vagrancy. A few weeks ago he sentenced an old man of 84 to six months, and a few days ago he sentenced Jeffrey Davis, a man 45 years old, to five months in the Central Prison for a like offence against the laws of his country. The old man arrived in the city yesterday and is now lodged in the common jail for no greater offence than being without visible means of support.

Skirtmakers' Picnic.—The manager and Miss Rose, of the Metropolitan Suit and Skirt Company, entertained the staff at a picnic at Springbank Wednesday evening. The party left the city at 5 o'clock and had a program of sports and a baseball game. The work of some of the girls at bat was something that would have opened the eyes of the captains of the Canadian League. There was a prize for the prettiest girl in the crowd, but it was not awarded, because of the difficulty of choosing the one being without visible means of support.

BOARD OF WORKS RESENTS CHARGE OF THE COMMITTEE
Street Oiling Difficulties Under Discussion Again Thursday Night.

No. 3 Has Enough To Do in Watering Streets, Its Members Declare.

Street oiling difficulties of the council took another tack last night, when the board of works discussed the suggestion from the fire, water and light committee that street oiling should be improved. The suggestion was hardly one that found favor in the eyes of the board of works.

"Street watering is enough for No. 3 committee to look after," said Chairman Bennett, of the Board. "It has enough to do with that without monkeying with street oiling."

"Let them do it if they want to," commented Ald. J. H. Saunders. "Last year they had the chance to have it, but didn't know enough to take it. Now they want it."

Resent Criticism.
The members of the board resented the statements of the fire, water and light committee that the work was improperly done.

"It's ridiculous the way the street watering has been done this year, and yet they talk to us about oiling," declared Chairman Bennett.

"Yes, and we've had to oil streets they should have watered," supplemented Ald. Saunders. As the estimates have been struck for the year, nothing could be done to transfer the control of street oiling to the water committee, as was asked, and so the proposition was passed up.

Pavement Bids.
The board recommended to the council the acceptance of the bids of Foley & Gleason, Ottawa, for the construction of asphalt pavements on Waterloo street, between King and Bathurst streets and on Piccadilly street from Richmond to St. George streets. The contract prices are: \$6,130 and \$3,740 respectively.

Another paving question that was up, was that of Wortley road. Headed by Dr. Robert Ferguson and C. B. Hunt, a deputation of ratepayers appeared before the board to ask why the pavement petitioned for some time ago was not laid. The explanation made was that the question of debenture sale and investigation into the durability of the specific class of pavement recommended for that street, had held up the work. Speedy work was promised from now on, however.

Ald. J. H. Saunders demanded to know why the street railway had been allowed to tear up its switch on Adelaide street, permitting cars to run west on Central avenue. No permission had been granted, and Ald. Saunders wanted to know how it was the company had started the work. On his recommendation City Engineer Asplint was instructed to stop the work till the council was able to investigate the matter.

CADETS' PARADE THROUGH STREETS DELIGHT CROWDS
Fine Showing Made During Route March by the Boy Soldiers.

Lads Show Remarkable Precision and General Efficiency—900 Out.

Thousands of citizens turned out on Thursday evening to witness the parade of the cadets who are encamped at present on Carling's Heights. Unstinted praise was accorded the boys all along the line of march, for the smartness and general efficiency shown. They marched with great steadiness and their deportment would have done credit to many a militia camp.

Leaving the camp grounds at 7 o'clock, the boys, under command of Col. Hodgins, proceeded to Richmond and Dundas streets, thence north to Dufferin avenue, along Dufferin avenue to Victoria Park, through the park to Central avenue, and by Central to the camp grounds.

The streets were thickly lined with people, and the boys were met with enthusiastic applause, which they fully merited. The parade was headed by Col. Hodgins and staff, and the band of the Seventh Regiment, which accompanied the cadets as far as Victoria Park. In front of the soldiers' monument the band turned aside and played the boys' past, after which a band concert was given. The band of the First Hussars also furnished splendid music for the march.

The Music Helped.
Too much cannot be said for the bugle bands of the various corps. They showed clearly the results of the painstaking efforts which have been taken in instructing them, and also the faithful practice put in by the boys themselves. Their music was splendid and doubtless had a great deal to do with the precision and swing of the marching. The pipe band, heading the Chatham cadets, was most generous with its selections, playing nearly all the time. They were greeted with loud applause. The whole four battalions took part in the parade, the cadets in line numbering about 900.

The uniforms were the subject of much favorable comment. Although great latitude is allowed in choosing the style of uniform, they are all cut along military lines and looked exceedingly smart.
