SITUATION HOPELESS.

Pekin, May 7.—5:05 p.m.—There i good reason to believe that China is prepared to concede everything denanded by Japan, realizing that the situation is hopeless.

This possible outcome to the present tense situation is not generally comprehended in Pekin; consequently mber of foreign residents, as well as Chinese themselves, are today packing their personal belongings and otherpreparing for eventualities. It was ascertained here today that the Japanese Government yesterday presented to the Chinese minister at Tokio a note warning him that China must accept the demands of Japan, as otherwise there would be presented to her an ultimatum, the expiration of which would be fixed for 6 p.m. of Sunday, May 9.

tions and thereby contribute to world peace. Depends on Promise.

had promised the United States that she would not violate American treaty rights with China or interfere with "open door" policy to which the United States and other powers are committed. In this connection it pointed out that the American Government has no intention of surrendering any of its treaty rights with China, the surrender of which, it added, has not been asked by either Japan or China.

In some quarters the statement is interpreted to mean that although the American Government will not tender its good offices to bring about a settlement of the questions at issue between China and Japan its services are at their disposal if wanted.

In place of a graduated surtax on stronger beers, the chancellor recommends a rearrangement of the existing taxes, lessening the tax on the lighter brews and increasing it on the heavier but without any alteration in the average of the existing taxes.
