YOUNG FARM BOY BELIEVED SUICIDE

Body of Sylvester Wilson
Found Under Bush
Near Galt.

Galt, June 24.—The body of Sylvester Wilson, aged 18, son of Douglas Wilson, 25 St. Andrews street, was found this morning under some bushes on the West River road just

outside the city limits. There was a bullet wound in the right temple and a 22-calibre rifle was lying beside the body.

While it is thought that this is a case of suicide, Coroner Dr. Radford, after consulting the crown attorney, has ordered an inquest, which was opened tonight and adjourned until Friday.

Discovery of the tragedy was made by a farm hand who was driving to the city this morning and whose attention was attracted by a horse on one side of the road and a buggy at the other. During his investigation he found the body and immediately reported the matter to the city and provincial police. Owing to absence of means of identification on the body or clothing identification was delayed until tonight.

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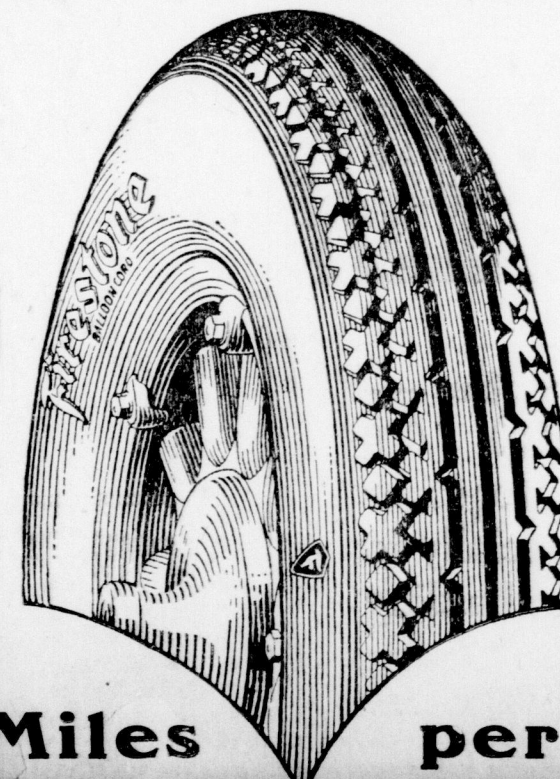
