RULES CALL FOR TEACHERS' TRIP

Criticism in Regard to Detroit Tour Answered by Inspector Wheable.

Some criticism has been heard and questions have been asked at election meetings of school trustees concerning the trip the public school teachers made recently to visit Detroit schools for a day.

In this connection, Administrator G. A. Wheable, B.A., M.C., points out that the department of education regulations are quite specific, setting aside two days for a teachers' convention each year, and providing that the schools shall be closed on the days of the convention.

Referring particularly to the feature of a trip being made out of town, Mr. Wheable quotes the following two clauses of the regulations:

"With the approval of the minister of education, the executive of an institute may substitute for all or part of the annual meeting a visit of inspection by the members of the institute to other schools or institutions of an educational character, where the work has a direct bearing upon that of the public and separate schools.

"The program shall be sent at least two weeks before the day of the meeting to each member of the institute, the boards of trustees employing them, and the director of teachers' institutes, parliament buildings, Toronto."

Mr. Wheable points out that the program of the London teachers' institute was duly forwarded to Premier G. H. Ferguson, minister of education, for his consideration and approval, as provided for in the regulations, and that no protest was received. The second day of the convention was held at the central collegiate institute last Friday, with an educational lecture the previous evening in Empress avenue school, for the discussion of educational matters.

What Regulations Say.

It is compulsory for the public school, and separate school teachers to attend the meetings of the institute, as set forth in the following clauses:

"The public school, the lay Roma Catholic school, and the continuation school grade C teachers, whose schools are situated within the inspectorate or inspectorates constituting an institute, shall register as members thereof, and shall attend all the meetings promptly and regularly.

"At the close of the annual meeting the names of the absentees from the forenoon and afternoon sessions shall be reported promptly by the secretary to the inspector concerned.

"Registration and attendance at an institute on the part of teachers of high schools, collegiate institutes and grades A and B continuation schools are optional, but are strongly recommended by the minister."

Mr. Wheable states that the largest representation of London public school teachers that ever attended an institute took in the trip to Detroit a week or so ago. In fact, fourteen teachers, who were either ill themselves or had serious illness in their families, participated in the trip, which proved of great benefit to all concerned.

Incidentally, Trustees Mrs. J. I. A. Hunt, Rev. R. D. Mess and George F. Copeland, Mr. Wheable and Inspector J. C. Stothers, M.A., B.Ed., also made the trip.

LIBERAL ASSOCIATION MEETS FRIDAY EVENING

Has Enjoyed Year of Great Activity Under Leadership of J. C. Elliott.

All Liberals of London are cordially invited to attend a meeting of the London Liberal Association to be held at Hyman hall tomorrow (Friday) evening, at 8 o'clock, for the purpose of electing a new executive of the association for the coming year.

J. C. Elliott, K.C., member-elect for West Middlesex in the federal house, is the retiring president. Under his leadership the association has enjoyed a year of great activity, and the showing made in the recent federal election by the Liberal candidate, E. S. Little, is regarded as a tribute to the effectiveness of the organization. With the possibility of a provincial election in the near future, it is most desirable that the association should continue to be active, and a strong executive is looked for as a result of tomorrow night's election.

MARITIME MISSIONARY TO PAY LONDON VISIT

A. M. Belding Will Address Meeting of London Rotary Club Monday.

A. M. Belding of the St. John, New Brunswick, Times-Journal, known as the missionary from the Maritimes, is to be in London from Friday to Monday. The London chamber of commerce has arranged to have Mr. Belding speak to the members of the Rotary club at their regular luncheon meeting on Monday.

Mr. Belding is returning to New Brunswick following the conference of Canadian chambers of commerce recently held in Winnipeg, results and findings from which gathering were presented to the government at Ottawa yesterday, with Lieut.-Col. Brown and R. H. Dowler, president of the local chamber of commerce, as members of the committee appointed to carry out this duty.

WASTE BY LONDON OF COKE ALLEGED

Trades Council Will Protest to City on Sewage Plant Business.

A vigorous letter of protest will be sent by the London trades and labor council to D. S. C. R. headquarters in Ottawa regarding the new restrictions just announced in relief work among veterans. At a meeting last night the council went on record as opposing any cut in help to ex-soldiers, and especially disabled men.

Criticism was levelled against the city by R. Foxcroft for failure to utilize for municipal purposes the supply of coke at the sewage plant.

"The city is buying coal while thousands of tons of good coke are being ignored," he declared. "People are carrying it away for \$2.75 a load."

The council decided to lay a protest in the matter with City Clerk Baker.

A deputation of the unemployed, consisting of Messrs. A. Avery, W. Phillips and Hollett, was assured the co-operation of the council in winter work.

Secretary J. F. Thomson reported that he had received five favorable replies to the ten questionnaires he had sent to education board candidates. The questionnaire asked whether the candidate favored the placing of a union labor clause in all municipal contracts.

The Labor Day committee announced that the proceeds for the 1925 event were \$1,000.

Fair Wage Clause.

The trades council is determined to get a statement of some kind from all school trustees and candidates for the new school board on a fair wage clause for all contracts let by the board. Secretary Thomson said he had written to all trustees and candidates asking their opinions on this matter in view of the unsatisfactory treatment received from the board by our delegation. "The secretary, in his letter, asked if the candidates approved a clause similar to the city of London clause to be used in all school contracts."

"I have received four replies in the last 24 hours, all of which are favorable. The inclusion of a fair wage clause in all school contracts similar to that imposed by the city council in its contracts," said Mr. Thomson. "They come from G. H. Tennant, G. F. Copeland, Frank H. Curran and William H. Curran. I have also been in touch by telephone with Mr. Cairncross, who seemed to me to favor the suggestion."

The council appointed a special committee to deal with all replies from the candidates and to arrange for the publication of the names of those favorable to the idea among trades unionists and labor men in the city before the end of this week. The council decided not to vote for any candidate who either did not reply or did not favor the introduction of a fair wage clause in school contracts.

"London has a reputation for paying the lowest wages in the building trades of any city in the province," said R. H. Foxcroft, president of the local union of carpenters. "In the case of Empress avenue school, the university buildings, the collegiate and the medical school, men from outside the city were employed by contractors at lower rates than London men—paying city taxes and working for the city. This is not good business for the city. Surely the London taxpayers should have priority on the work of this kind even at higher wages, for it all stays in the city."

Two City Cents an Hour.

"I am told the laborers on the new collegiate are being offered 20 cents an hour. I do not know whether that is so, but the whole arrangement out there should be investigated at once. The contract accepted by the board was the lowest of all contracts by such a large sum, about \$25,000 I believe, that it looks as if he has taken the job on the theory of getting low-priced winter help when employment is scarce. The school board should realize that the lowest tender is not always good business for the city."

The new collegiate also came in for criticism by the stationary engineers on the score that "four of the five engineers employed on the hoisting machinery do not hold the necessary certificates."

President Ward of the local union of stationary engineers, said: "Four of the five men on the job at the new collegiate are operating hoisting machinery and boilers are not holding certificates. We have appealed to the examination board at Toronto, but have as yet received no reply."

The council passed a resolution asking for an investigation into conditions among engineers on the new collegiate, a copy of which will be sent to the provincial minister of labor.

GRAFTON SALES PEOPLE HEAR INTERESTING TALK

Harold W. Donahue Deals With Problems of Selling and Advertising.

A real get-together evening, with suggestions and solutions for many present-day business problems, was held at Grafton & Co.'s store on Dundas street last evening. Harold W. Donahue of The London Advertiser staff was the speaker of the evening and he addressed a large gathering of out-of-town managers and store employees.

Introduced by Mr. J. Hickey, manager of the local store, Mr. Donahue began his talk with reference to the establishment of Grafton & Co. 73 years ago. He dealt in an interesting way with the history of the company up to the present day. Courtesy, observation, selling ideas, and other topics were discussed in new ways by using as illustrations actual happenings during the past week in the store's daily activities.

At the end of the sales talk, which covered 14 headings of three minutes each, Mr. Hall made a hearty vote of thanks to the speaker and suggested that the salesmen for one-half hour "harpoon" Mr. Donahue for further criticisms and ideas. A lively discussion took place and many valuable ideas were brought out.

Mr. Donahue was invited to go to Woodstock and Brantford to speak at future meetings.

The evening came to a happy close by Mr. Hickey taking over forty guests to Wong's. After a sumptuous repast, dancing closed the evening.

Two Public Bodies Interested in Acquiring Property From Board of Education.

It is more than probable that the board of education is going to be able to sell some of its idle property.

The property in question is the old Quebec street public school, which the board decided only recently to list with certain other properties for sale, because of the decision to house Pottersburg public school pupils in the new Beck collegiate institute on Dundas street east.

St. Matthew's Anglican church desires to secure the old school for the purpose of turning it into a parish hall, while the public library board would like to secure the school as a branch library for that particular section of the city.

The board is holding its regular meeting next week, and it is expected that definite offers will be in the hands of the board by that time from both the parties said to be interested in the building.

TWO BLOWS DID IT.

Everett, Wash., Dec. 2.—Big Bill McKenzie, the 238-pound giant discovered by Lonnie Austin, Seattle, in the Canadian woods, took just two blows to end his scheduled six-round fight with Charlie Bushkin, 240-pound Vancouver, B.C., negro, here last night. He knocked Bushkin down for the count of nine with the first blow and broke his jaw with the second, a right uppercut.

MAJOR ABANDONS ROLE OF CANDIDATE AT MEETING

Mayor George A. Wetzel was seen in a dual role at Ealing school last night.

First as mayorality candidate, occupying the platform in explanation of his attitude in regard to city transportation, he defended and attacked, and finally brought satisfied applause.

Then as a member of the police commission, he stepped from the platform to order Police Constable McMaster to eject a persistent heckler who challenged the mayor to answer a long list of questions.

"I am not on the platform as mayor now," his worship declared. "As chairman of the police commission I order you to take that man from the room," he said as the policeman waved.

MAN HURT AT CROSSING SHOWS BIG IMPROVEMENT

Cyril Hayes, injured when his motor car was struck by a C. P. R. train at St. George street crossing Tuesday, shows favorable improvement in his condition today, according to officials at St. Joseph's hospital where Hayes was taken following the crash in which his nephew, Howard Clark, lost his life.

Hayes suffers from an injured spine, broken ribs and cut face and hands. It was at first believed he was injured internally, but his physician is now of the opinion that he is well out of danger.

ROBBERS BLAMED FOR PLOT TO BLOW UP TRAIN IN WEST

Canadian Press Despatch. Regina, Sask., Dec. 3.—Provincial and railway police are today conducting a country-wide search for two men who last night attempted to wreck Canadian Pacific railway train No. 3, westbound, presumably for the purpose of robbery. At daylight this morning dynamite, matches, copper wire and fuse string were found on the main line of the railway tracks about five miles west of Regina.

WOMAN FOUND DEAD.

Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, Dec. 3.—Mrs. Selma Weeks, 61, was found dead on her bedroom floor in a rooming house on Peel avenue today. It is thought that Mrs. Weeks was seized with a heart attack when she arose from bed and collapsed.
