THE SEXES

Women are becoming scarcer in Canada in proportion to the whole population, and this is particularly true of the western provinces. The census figures of 1911 show that the males in Canada in that year numbered 3,821,067, and the females 3,888,771, leaving the males in the majority by 437,296. Here are the figures by provinces.

It will be seen that while the West has fewer females relatively than the other provinces, there is no province in Canada which has more females than males. The census of 1901 showed that the males outnumbered the females by 132,101, and previous censuses, back as far as 1871, showed that the males were more numerous than the females, though there never has been any such difference in the totals as that recorded last year.

PANAMA CANAL AND CANADIAN TRADE

Will the Big Ditch Benefit Our Manufacturers?

STEAMSHIP MAN DOUBTS

Montreal, Aug. 8.—Discussing the much debated question on what value the opening of the Panama canal will be to Canada, Mr. D. W. Campbell, Canadian representative of the Elder Dempster steamship line, declared this morning that his experience during the past six years of traffic via the Tehuantepec route to Vancouver and other British Columbia points from Montreal and St. John, N. B., had impressed upon him the fact that the placing in operation of the "big ditch" would, to a very small extent, if indeed at all, benefit the manufacturers of this country.

Mr. Campbell said: We have secured each month in the summer an average of about 800 tons, but in the winter the only shipments we obtain for British Columbia points are a few tons of nails or a few canned lobsters shipped from Halifax. It must be borne in mind that shipments originating at points west of Belleville have to bear the local rail rate in summer to Montreal and in winter to St. John. Add this local rate to the ocean freight from Montreal via either the Panama canal or the Tehuantepec route, and it will be found that when the insurance and the much longer time in transit are also added, that manufacturers and receivers will in the majority of cases, even if they have to pay 5 or 10 cents per 100 pounds more, order their goods shipped all rail.

Washington, Aug. 8.—The defeat of the Burton amendment to strike out the discrimination in favor of American ships was the Senate's answer to the protest of the British Government against the legislation. It was this clause of the bill which led Great Britain to send a formal protest to the State Department. Just before the vote was taken, Senator Cummins made an impassioned speech in which he charged Senators who interpreted the Hay-Pauncefote treaty as denying to the United States the power to discriminate in favor of its own ships, with giving an interpretation which they knew the American people would not observe.

PERU RUBBER ATROCITIES

Lima, Peru, August 6.—Complete order is reported to prevail today in the Peruvian zone of jurisdiction of the Putumayo rubber district, where terrible atrocities committed on native workers were recently reported to have occurred, by Sir Roger Casement, who carried out an investigation on behalf of the British Government.

A despatch today from the city of Iquitos, on the upper Amazon, says both the press and authorities of that district express their conviction that the authors of the recent crimes in the Putumayo region were Colombian marauders, entirely unconnected with the firm of Arana, former owners of the rubber region.

It is also asserted in the newspapers that the reports of outrages were spread in order to discredit the Arana family, whose influence in the Peruvian Amazon Company was unpalatable to some of the British shareholders.

WERE BRITISHERS RESPONSIBLE?

London, August 6.—Premier Asquith in reply to a question in the House of Commons today stated that the British Government had decided to appoint a select Parliamentary committee of inquiry into the atrocities reported by Sir Roger Casement to have occurred in the Putumayo rubber district of Peru. The questioner requested the Government to inquire if any responsibility for the outrages rested on the British directors of the rubber company.
