Last evening a company of rifles nosted in a clump of trees on Sweet Kingston, Aug. 2—Yesterday the rifles posted in a clump of trees on Sweet water canal, were charged by a detachment of the enemy. The Rifles fired a single volley and fled in a panic for a mile till they reached the fortified waterworks. The enemy did not follow very far, but took the weapons thrown away by the British in their flight. The company's scare has created a terribly indignant feeling through. out the British camp. The position they abandoned has been occupied and the fugitives have been placed under arrest. It is now stated that the picket of the 60th Rifles put to flight by the enemy consisted only of six men and a corporal.

DE LESSEPS EXPLAINS. De Lesseps telegraphs that he made no protest against the entrance of British men-of-war into the Suez canal, but protested against the infractions of the com-pany's regulations committed by two vessels after entering the canal. ARABI'S GENTLE RULE.
