ERZING'S MISSION TO EGYPT

LONDON, Aug. 5.—Henry Labouchere

(radical) in the house of commons this

afternoon moved, and Sir Wilfrid Lawson,

radical, member for Carlisle, and Sir

George Campbell (liberal), member for

Kircaldy, seconded a motion that the house

reject the appropriation bill until the

present government explain their Egyptian

policy. The terms on which the govern-

ment had issued the Egyptian loan, said

Mr. Labouchere, were a public scandal.

Mr. Michael Hicks Beach, chancellor of

the exchequer, replied for the ministry,

said that the government had issued the

Another Day's Disclosure in the Central

Prison Investigation.

warden he gauged a prisoner named Post

for yelling. He admitted that he had

been smoking, knowing that he had

been acting contrary to the prison rules. Judge

Sinclair told him he should have resigned

his position.

Guard James said that "stringing up"

prisoners had been abandoned two years

ago.

Guard Hart has been employed at the prison

for four years. He confessed to every

crime which he committed at the prison.

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REGATTA AT HAMILTON.

AMATEUR OARSMEN RACING ON

BURLINGTON BAY.

Toronto Wins Four of the Six Events.

Hamilton Race, and Detroit One—A

Five Day and Fair Racing.

HAMILTON, Aug. 5.—A smooth course

and fine weather formed the order of the

day at Burlington Bay this afternoon,

when the Canadian association of amateur

oarsmen held their sixth annual regatta.

As the first race was called, a slight breeze

was blowing from the southeast, which

affected the course but little, as the bay

side is sheltered from any further or

eastly breeze by the heavy foliage on the

shore which lines the beach. Fair starts were

obtained, and throughout all the races not

a single foul was made, the spectators'

boats keeping well out of the way. About

seven thousand people witnessed the regatta

and showed their interest by the most

vigorous cheering.

Exactly at eleven minutes past two the

gun on the regatta boat gave the start

to the first race, a 200 yard sprint. The
