The Trade Returns. The trade returns for the four months of the current fiscal year were lished to-day. The exports total 48,646,986, a decrease of half a million as compared with the same peiod last year. This falling off arose last month, when the value of exports was \$830,000 less than in October, 1894. On the other hand, the imports of last month increased by two million dollars, and the duty collected by a quarter of a million. For the four months the imports are valued at \$39,813,073, an increase of \$513,000. The duty colected for the four months amount to \$6,910,261, an increase of \$875,000.


