OBITUARY.

Mrs. Helen Teresa Chesley.

The death occurred at Upper Granville, on Tuesday, March 29th of Mrs. Helen Teresa Chesley, widow of the late Phineas Lovett Chesley, who predeceased her by twenty-four years.

Mrs. Chesley was the eldest daughter of Capt. Joshua and Rebecca Ann (Hicks) Croscup of Lower Granville. She was a direct descendant of John Hicks, the second representative chosen for Granville in the Provincial General Assembly and Colonel Christopher Benson, who took an active part in the war of the Revolution, coming to this country as a Loyalist. She would have reached her 85th birthday on May 23rd. Though an invalid for five years she maintained always a patient and cheerful disposition and all her faculties unimpaired to the last. She was a woman of fine mind and strong character and was a member of the Church of England.

At the funeral which took place on Tuesday, "Crossing the Bar" and other favorite hymns were feelingly rendered by choir members. The services at the house and at the grave beside her husband in the Chesley cemetery, were conducted by the Rev. Canon Underwood. The floral remembrances from family and friends were especially beautiful.

She is survived by her five children, C. S. Chesley, of Hantsport; Florence, Mrs. A. N. Murray of Melrose, Mass.; Annie, Mrs. John McCormick of Granville and Misses Sadie and Lucy at home.

SEARCH FOR AGED MAN

Mr. Rufus Henry of Round Hill, Aged 92 Years Lost in Woods but Found by Search Party.—Death of Well Known Residents.—Personal Notes.

Annapolis Royal.—The death of Mr. John McKay, a well-known and highly esteemed citizen, took place on Sunday morning, after an illness extending over five years. The deceased was the son of the late John and Elizabeth (Hawkins) McKay and was born near Annapolis seventy-six years ago. In November, 1878, he married Miss Hannah Beeler, who survives him with one daughter, Bessie, wife of Mr. Charles Frost of Annapolis Royal, and a son, B. Primrose McKay, accountant at Yarmouth. A little daughter and three sons passed away in early childhood, and a grandson, Scot McKay, has made his home with Mr. and Mrs. McKay, since his infancy.

The late Mr. McKay was for seven years an efficient and popular Police Officer and was also janitor of the Post Office. It was during the destruction of this building by fire on March 16th, 1920, that he received the injuries that thereafter confined him to his home. The funeral took place on Monday with service at the house, conducted by Rev. A. Gibson, assisted by Rev. G. P. Raymond, Rev. T. C. Mellor and Rev. M. H. Macintosh.

Mr. George Litch, another well-known resident, passed away on Wednesday evening, after an illness of three weeks aged eighty-seven years. The late Mr. Litch moved here from Granville, over thirty years ago and purchased the Burns estate at the Mile Corner. He later moved into the handsome brick residence of the late Dr. A. B. Cunningham on Victoria Street, which he sold last spring to Daniel Owen, K. C., moving then to the Goldsmith farm on the Allain River Road, where he died. His first wife, formerly Miss Eleanor Sproule of Lower Granville, died about fifteen years ago, leaving one daughter, Margaret, widow of the late Joseph A. Bancroft, M. L. A., of Round Hill, and a son, Rev. J. Willard Litch, D. D., Superintendent of Baptist Missions in British Columbia. His second wife, who was Mrs. Hannah Harnish, widow of the late Isaac Harnish, of Lequille, survives him. The funeral service on Friday afternoon at the Baptist church, of which Mr. Litch was a devoted member, was largely attended.

This was the third funeral at which Rev. A. Gibson had officiated during the week, the second being that of Miss Bessie L. Durling, who died after a short illness, aged twenty-four years, and whose body was taken to Bridgetown for interment.

Much excitement was caused here on Friday by word that Mrs. Rufus Henry an aged resident of Round Hill, had been missing from the home of his daughter, Mrs. Edwin Spurr, since the afternoon before. A volunteer party of school boys and men left here shortly before noon and joined the hundred and twenty-five men already searching the woods. As Mr. Henry was ninety-two years of age and partially blind it was felt that he could not walk very far, but shortly after six o'clock the news came that George and William Ramsay had found him lying beside the stillwater.
