I suppose you could say that the bridge spans an international border and that there is no way in which we could entirely remove the government from being involved. However, perhaps this matter should be considered, just as another member on another day considered the possibility of our turning over the postal service of Canada to private enterprise. Perhaps I should say to hon. members that they should consider this possibility as well.

Finally, I want to pay a very high tribute to the hon. member for Sarnia-Lambton who has taken a personal interest in this bridge authority and who, as his speech demonstrated this afternoon, researched the matter and brought us his personal familiarity of the subject that is so unique when he told us that he was solicitor for the village of Point Edward and therefore totally familiar with the issue on the Ontario side.

Mr. Speaker, my microphone is going on and off and I am confused as to whether or not I should resume my seat.
