## HERD MAINTENANCE PROGRAM

Question No. 2,105—**Mr. McKnight:**

1. What was the number of applications (a) received (b) approved from the provinces of (i) Alberta (ii) Saskatchewan (iii) Manitoba under the herd maintenance program and, for each province, what was the total dollar amount approved?

2. What was the average period of time in terms of days between the time applications were received from each western province and the time when application approval and funding was sent out to each province?

**Hon. Pierre De Bané (Minister of Regional Economic Expansion):** The reply for the Department of Regional Economic Expansion is as follows:

2. Applications from all provinces were processed centrally in Regina. Average time between receipt of application forms and mailing of assistance cheques was 44 days.

## FULL-TIME UNIVERSITY STUDENTS

Question No. 2,654—**Mr. Herbert:**

Does the government record full-time university student enrolment by province and by province of permanent residence and, if so, was there a significant change in the past five years in the percentage of out-of-province students?

**Hon. J.-J. Blais (Minister of Supply and Services):** Statistics Canada records annually full-time university enrolment by province and by province of residence. For the last five years for which data are available (1975-76 to 1979-80) there has been virtually no change in the proportion of out-of-province students in Canadian universities. In each of the five years, the proportion has been approximately 20 per cent. There are some differences, however, by level of study. While the proportion of undergraduate students from out-of-province remained stable (17 per cent) the proportion of graduate students from out-of-province declined from 45 per cent in 1975-76 to 38 per cent in 1979-80.
