INDIAN AFFAIRS

Mr. Doug Fee (Red Deer): Mr. Speaker, I too have a petition that has been certified correct according to form and content under Standing Order 36.

This petition adds to the total number of signatures I have in my office; 1,132 people have signed this. The petition calls upon Parliament to reconsider a decision made by the provincial court of Alberta which ruled that the rights of aboriginal people include the right to hunt for profit on private land.

The petitioners call upon Parliament to support an appeal of this court decision and conclude an agreement with Canada's treaty Indians regarding sound wildlife management practices and restrict native rights to hunt, fish and gather for personal consumption needs and prohibit the sale for profit, wildlife meat or parts obtained by treaty rights.

THE CONSTITUTION

Mr. Bill Domm (Peterborough): Mr. Speaker, I have a petition which I wish to enter into the House today to make Parliament aware of the fact that a large number of constituents in the federal riding of Peterborough have asked that the government consider legislation providing for a referendum of the people to accept or reject constitutional amendments proposed by the Government of Canada.

I am pleased to present this petition with pages of signatures, all in support of a referendum on constitutional changes.

Question No. 240—**Mrs. Feltham:**

With respect to the Canada 125 Corporation (a) how will the federal funds be allocated (b) will any part of the federal allocation be used for salaries or bonuses?

Hon. Robert R. de Cotret (Secretary of State of Canada): In so far as the Canada 125 Corporation is concerned the answer is as follows:

(a) Maximum allocation by activity

Projects:	\$34.6 million
Communications:	\$10.8 million
Marketing:	\$1.5 million
Administration:	\$3.1 million
TOTAL:	\$50.0 million

(b) Of the \$50 million, \$4.8 million will be used for salaries.

Question No. 301—**Mr. Butland:**

With respect to the inserts included with new Government of Canada cheques released in April 1992 (a) what was the cost of (i) designing (ii) producing (iii) printing (b) what companies or individuals were paid for this work (i) when were they paid (ii) by whom were they paid (c) how many inserts were produced?

Hon. Paul Wyatt Dick (Minister of Supply and Services): With respect to the inserts included with new Government of Canada cheques released in April 1992:

(a)(i)(ii) the insert was designed and produced using internal SSC resources. Consequently no additional cost outside the government was incurred;

(iii) the cost of printing the new cheque insert was a approximately \$170,000;

(b) St. Joseph Printing Limited was paid by Supply and Services Canada during March 1992 for printing these inserts;

(c) approximately 22 million inserts were produced
