THE PROPER WORD? TO TAKE ACTION

One of the City's Private Bills Will Bring Up Question of Bi- Ambitious Program Drawn Worrying People in

Man Could Call Land His Own.

A clause in one of the city's private bills relating to the expropriation of property, is causing owners in the townships a good deal of uneasiness. It is Clause 4, in Bill No. 54, which will give the city power to compel an owner to hold land for expropriation at a future date simply by intimating that the land will be required.

w. A. Clarke, the York Township clerk, claims that as the clause now stands, it may work out very unjustly in many cases, and that it is really more in the nature of confiscation than expropria-

"Suppose that a man had ten acres in the township," he said, "and the city decided it was needed for a park; no definite promise need be made that the land would be purchased by the city, or any date set for the deal going thru. That owner will just have to pay taxes on the property and await the city's pleasure, and in ten years he might be informed that the property would not be required. During the interim he might have disposed of the property two or three times, and have lost a large amount of money because his land was tied up, "Why, when you consider the thing for a minute, you can see how the city could speculate with half the land in the township under this 'we intend to expropriate' outrage.

Actual Wording Counts,

"Of course, the intention of the bill may not be so sweeping as that clause actually reads, but it is the actual wording which will count, if disputes occur, and when that is passed no man, either in the city or its neighborhood, will be able to call his land his own.

Dr. Godfrey to Act.

"I feel just as strongly as Mr. Wright on the question of bilingual schools," said Dr. Godfrey. "I do not care what they do with the French language in the Province of Quebec, but I believe that the English language, and it alone, should be retained in Ontario. I think you will hear from me on this matter in no uncertain way probably next week on the floor of the legislature." (Applause.)

Dr. Godfrey went on to speak of the work of the Whitney government, and especially with regard to the liquor legislation which they have enacted since coming into power. He cited over thirty examples of beneficial enactments which the Ontario Government have passed.

"Under the Whitney government," said the member for West York, "the bartender is responsible for infringement of the law; the penalties for infringements have been doubled; there is no canvassing by liquor interests in local option districts; the minister has power to veto all licenses; the three-fifths clause ensures permanency; the sale of liquor to persons under 21 is prohibited; no license is issued without consent of the minister; non-residents are prohibited from voting on local option bylaws; and this is the party Mr. Rowell would have you believe are in league with the liquor interests."


