**Ratepayers' Meeting.**  
A large and enthusiastic meeting of the North Earls court and Fairbank Ratepayers' Association was held last evening in Vaughan road public school. President Badams occupied the chair, and Deputy Reeve Miller, H. J. Hill and Chas. Mansley were among those present.

Deputy Reeve Miller and the postmaster-general, and the township secretary read a communication from F. Maclean, stating he had forwarded an association's letter to the postmaster-general, and that he would follow the matter up. No reply has been received from the York Township council to a similar letter.

Deputy Reeve Miller stated that Maclean had told him that when the districts were laid out in sections, a plan would be sent to the postmaster-general for approval.

**Street Lighting.** The matter of street lighting, Fred Switt said, Mr. Miller made the statement about a year ago that the township council had practically settled to have the Hydro-Electric Light Company put in the lights in the township. He also stated that the township council were negotiating with the new manager of the Hydro-Electric Company—at the present time. Mr. Miller, in reply, stated that the Hydro-Electric people are doubtful whether there is enough business in the district at the present time to warrant putting in the electric light.

Residents of Fairbank wish that the Bell Telephone Company would install a telephone in some store in the district, and are confident that the revenue would amply repay the company.

At present if anyone wants to send a message to the city, he has to go by horse to send a messenger to the nearest pay station on St. Clair avenue, a distance of nearly two miles. Much property has been lost by fire because of alarm being delayed in by a messenger at the Fairbank house.
