

## **BUDGET DEBATE** STILL DRAGS ON

Borden Promises to Make An- Tariff Changes Bear Hard on Farmers, Says A. B. McCoig.

Sharp Reduction in Contract Charges of Opposition Refuted - Will Give Notice of Stamp Duties.

OTTAWA, March 3.—Gen. Hughes laid on the table of the commons a return which stated, in reply to a question by William German of Welland, that 28 2-3 sets of various sizes of tires for trucks had been purchased from the Canada Cycle and Motor Co., at an average price of \$390 per set. These were for the first contingent. The contract price for tires for trucks for the second contingent was \$247 per set.

The premier stated in answer to Mr. Verville, that representations had been made from time to time other overnment regarding the unemployment problem, and it was the intention of the government to assist in every way that might be practicable or reasonable. Regarding the proposal to establish a national government laior for which appropriations were asked were under way, he said, when the matter was under consideration, and there would be an announcement in due course.
