I intend neither panegyric nor abuse; and I have no cause to serve, but that of truth, and of my country. If, therefore, in the course of this address, I any where impose upon you; I have been first, unknowingly, imposed upon myself. Be assured, however, that nothing in my power, has been left undone, to avoid this missortune; and that, on the contrary, I have exerted my best endeavours to procure every light, every information, which a private man could, by the most deliberate research, arrive at the knowledge of: and the result of this enquiry shall
