Note and Comment

After their jaunt at Rosedale, the Varsity boys were ready for a work-out yesterday, but little was done, except a run in the rain. Secret practice will be unnecessary, as the men increased their proficiency about to perfection on Saturday by carrying out their box of tricks. They know when to use them.

Some of the Hamilton papers infer that the Varsity boys will prove unable to stand the gauntlet, forgetting that the students average only three or four pounds per man lighter than the Tigers, and could handle the same ingredients themselves. However, this is the kind of stuff that gets you to the sidelines, and it is on the field that championships are won.

It is interesting to note the confidence displayed in the Tigers' camp, also the anxiety of their supporters to get 2 to 1 for their money.

The official batting averages of the American Baseball League show that while Jackson of the Cleveland in twenty games took the list with 29 hits and a percentage of .387, the leaders of the Detroit and Cleveland, separated by a single point. Cobb in 19 games made 156 hits for an average of .350, while Lajoie in 189 games knocked out 277 bingles for .341. Speaker of Boston followed with 183 hits in 141 games, with .340. Struck of the Athletics in 17 games and Hornsby of Cleveland in 17 games have better averages than Eddie Collins of the world's champions, but the latter took part in 133 games, scoring 128 hits for .222. Jack Knight of the New York Highlanders stands ninth in the list, with .212 for 117 games, in which he has safely 122 times. Olding and Murphy of the Athletics are not far behind him, with .208 and .200, respectively. Thirteen of the Toronto hits .20 or better, which is further evidence that the grip of the pitchers has been greatly increased.

In team batting the Athletics lead with an average of .266 for 156 games, in which they made a total of 124 hits. The New York Highlanders are fourth in this respect with an average of .257. Detroit tops the list in scoring with 671 runs, the Athletics being second with 673. Boston third with 640 and New York fourth with 625. Boston leads in home runs with 227. The Athletics are first with two-base hits, 266, also with three-base hits, 108. But the Boston lead in home runs with 44.

Individual work shows that Cobb leads in run getting with 105, Collins is first in base stealing with 81. In sacrifice hits Hooper of Boston ranks ahead of everybody with 24.

Of the Toronto men in the American Bill Carriagans won 14 games, Mitchell of New York 230 in 68 and Ben House of Philadelphia only 139 in 54 games. The Toronto men have won 11 games in 11 games, while with Detroit in 11 games, they have won 11 games.

With the racing year, generally accepted as closing with the inauguration of the winter season, rapidly nearing the end, it is appropriate to look ahead and make ready to crown the champion jockey, writes Bert Collier. In casting the mind over the 20 leaders of the profession, one finds that Jockey Garner has ridden the most winners. Up to and including one week ago Garner had had 277 mounts and was first 15 times, second 16, third 10 and unplaced 34 times. However, from a percentage basis, the only logical way of determining the true ability of a rider, Garner falls far short of Carroll Shilling, who had 440 mounts, 153 firsts, 51 seconds and unplaced 184 times. The simple method of deduction shows that Shilling earned a percentage of 34, while Garner has earned only 27. The outstanding feature of the entire recapitulation, however, is the marvelous work of Jockey Shilling, a rider without a peer in the present. To the ability of Shilling can be attributed the splendid success of the Toronto of San Francisco, and incidentally the magnificent sum of \$100,000, their aggregate winnings during the year.
