BILL CARRIGAN TO

MANAGE RED SOX

Boston, Mass., Jan. 31.—That Bill Carrigan would be manager of the Boston American League Baseball Club this season was the prediction made by baseball writers here tonight. The former catcher and manager of the team is now a banker at Lewiston. Maine. He said over the long distance telephone today that he was ready to help out the Red Sox in the war emergency. Jack Barry, the present manager, who succeeded Carrigan when the latter retired from baseball two years ago, is a yeoman in the navy and will not be able to play ball this year. Harry H. Frazee, president of the club, said today that the managership matter was still undecided.

Mr. Frazee has a plan by which either the Red Cross or some other war relief agency will benefit from the gate receipts at the American League games played in this city, and he telegraphed Ban Johnson, president of the league, today, urging that the plan be adopted in other major league baseball cities. In explanation Mr. Frazee said that to the price of a 25-cent bleacher seat plus the war tax of 3 cents there would be added 2 cents for the Red Cross, thus making the price of bleacher seats 30 cents. The plan, which will apply also to other seats, will obviate the necessity of making change in pennies.

Announcement was also made by Mr. Frazee that Connie Mack, manager of the Philadelphia team, had until March 15 to decide what players he would take from the Red Sox in exchange for Stuffy McInnis, who was recently traded by Philadelphia to Boston.
