EDWARD OPENS "KINGSWAY" COSTLY LONDON THOROFARE

Troops, Crowds and Decorations at Ceremonial Recognition of a Big Improvement.

London, Oct. 18.—The fine new thoroughfare formed by Kingsway and Aldwych, connecting the Strand and Holborn, through the heart of congested London, was opened to-day by King Edward with considerable ceremonial. Queen Alexandra and other members of the royal family were present. The route was lined with troops, the decorations were on a pretentious scale and immense crowds gathered to participate in the event.

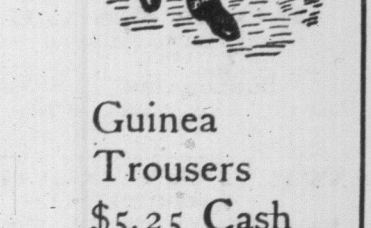
The new street is considered to be the most important improvement carried out in the metropolis since the construction of Regent-street in 1825. The work occupied six years and cost over \$30,000,000, of which it is estimated that two-thirds will be recovered by the sale of building sites.

WORK COUNTY AND 80 BUBBS CAN'T STOP THIS FAIR

Big Show at Woodbridge Will Go on To-Day, Be the Weather as it May.

Woodbridge, Oct. 18.—Despite the steady downpour of rain to-day, Woodbridge fair opened on time. Of course the attendance was small—it never is large on the first day, anyway—but the entries in nearly every class eclipse all previous years in number and quality. The entries in live stock are also very large. There are 110 entries in sheep, over 500 in poultry, over 600 in ladies' work, over 150 in domestic manufactures, and in butter. All other classes are equally well represented, and it only waits for the weather to-morrow to make this the most successful fair in the history of Woodbridge. It was at first thought it would be better to postpone the second day's events until Friday, but at a meeting of the fair committee to-day, it was decided to go on with the fair to-morrow.

Toronto Junction

Toronto, Oct. 18.—Medical Health Officer Dr. Mason has received the samples of Junction water back from Michigan analysis. Dr. Mason says that, while it is impure, the presence of colic bacilli being distinctly noticeable, the people now being advised to boil their water before taking. The theory that the impure water finds its way into the Junction River is regarded as absurd, the general opinion being that it comes out of Toronto every time the east wind blows the sewage thru the western gap straight into the intake pipe.

Pine Grove

Pine Grove, Oct. 18.—Edward Bennett, a man about 60 years of age, who came from Michigan about two weeks ago, died yesterday at the residence of Harvey Kaiser here, and the funeral will take place to-day at the cemetery to-morrow afternoon. Rev. Mr. McKinnon, pastor of Woodbridge Presbyterian Church, officiating.

York Township

The will of Patrick Gilman of York Township, who died Nov. 25, 1904, disposes of an estate of \$60,000, which included household goods \$200, improved real estate \$100,000, cash \$288,51, farm produce \$800, real estate \$60, and third interest in the estate of Miss Mary, deceased, \$100. W. A. Parsons, sr., is the executor. The estate is equally divided among the daughter and adopted son.

New York, Oct. 18.—An attempt to batter down the door of District Attorney W. T. Jerome's office was made to-day by Jacob Meyer, who said he wanted to kill Jerome. Meyer was found by the police trying to get thru the panels of the door and shouting that Jerome had failed to pay him sufficient fees for his services as a witness in the Red Light investigations a few years ago.

GOULD RESIGNS

New York, Oct. 18.—Announcement was made to-day that George J. Gould had resigned as chairman of the Wash-Railroad Company, and had been succeeded by J. J. G. Henry, president of the Devoe and Rio Grande Company. F. A. Delano was elected president of the Wash-R.

Winnipeg, Oct. 18.—The board of trustees has decided to give the installation of a municipal telephone system, unless a perceptible improvement is immediately made in the Bell Company's present service.

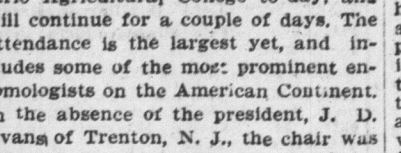

TUSSOCK MOTH EXTERMINATORS

One Topic Discussed at Entomological Society Convention.

Guelph, Oct. 18.—(Special)—The 42nd annual meeting of the Entomological Society of Ontario opened at the Ontario Agricultural College to-day, and will continue for a couple of days. The attendance is the largest yet, and includes some of the most prominent entomologists on the American Continent.

In the absence of the president, J. D. Evanson of Trent, N. J., the chair was filled by Dr. James Fletcher, C. E. F., of Ottawa.

This morning the council met, and announced the presentation of reports and other business, the establishment of a Guelph branch of the society was ratified. The officers appointed were: President, Prof. Sherman; vice-president, R. Readwin; secretary-treasurer, T. D. Jarvis; executive officer, C. K. Klinek. The society has now a membership of over four hundred, fifty per cent of which are enrolled during the present convention.

J. B. Williams discussed insects prevalent in the district to-day. He spoke of Ottawa spoke of the alder plant louse, and Dr. Bethune of London and others discussed the cottony scale, tussock moth, white grub, wireworm, twelve-spotted asparagus beetle, Hessian fly and pea.

An address on the tussock moth in Quebec was given by Rev. Dr. Fyles of Quebec, who pointed out the favored food plant was the white willow. The moth was given credit for doing more damage to the maple, A remedy was given for the moth in Ontario and in Guelph was the horse chestnut. In Ottawa was the maple, A remedy was the spraying of trees with Paris green.

Prof. F. Sherman of the O. A. C. spoke on the "Entomological Conditions in North Carolina," comparing them with those in Ontario. Prof. Loehbein's address on the recent experiments with the San Jose scale discussed the treatment of the insect in the Niagara district. To spray with lime sulphur, and salt water was the best remedy. The Canadian mixture was best, but not as successful. Dr. Smith of New Jersey recommended the lime sulphur and petroleum or kerosene for the apples and pears.

The evening session included addresses of welcome from President Creelman of the O. A. C. and B. Barlow, president of the Wellington Field Naturalists Club; an inaugural address by Dr. Fletcher; and an illustrated address by Dr. J. B. Smith on "The Mosquito 'Extermination in New Jersey'." Amongst the prominent entomologists present were: Dr. J. B. Smith, New Jersey; Dr. Fletcher, Ottawa; Dr. Bethune, London; George S. Fletcher, Burlington; A. Gibson of Ottawa; Rev. Dr. Fyles, Quebec; H. H. Lyman, F. L. S. Montreal; C. J. Young, Ottawa; Dr. E. M. Walker, Toronto; and Charles Stevenson, Montreal.

TO INCREASE THE SALARIES OF ONTARIO SCHOOL TEACHERS A committee of the Ontario Educational Association will meet at the Normal School on the 27th inst., to prepare such a scheme as will in the opinion of the members raise the status of the teacher, particularly with reference to salary.

The committee will then submit their recommendations to the minister of education.

THEY BROKE OPEN THE HOUSE

Landlord, Bailiff and Assistant in the Suit—Damages for False Arrest.

The jury brought in a verdict of \$100 for Fred G. Lerne, who sued R. C. Tidale for false arrest. Judge Street charged strongly in favor of the plaintiff. The amount asked for was \$200.

Andrew McParren, the East Queen street grocer; Edward Gegg, bailiff, and Joseph Colton, one of his men, were defendants in the next case called. They are asked to pay damages amounting to \$600, because "they did with force and violence break open the door of the house and remove a quantity of the goods and furniture" of the plaintiff, Mrs. Robena Berry.

Mrs. Berry conducted a boarding house, known as "Rosemont," at Balmy Beach. Last June her daughter was stricken with smallpox, the house was quarantined and she lost her boarders, which put her behind in her rent.

Mrs. Berry testified that on July 15, last, McParren and Bailiff Colton, came to the house, and with force and violence broke open a door and threatened violence "that he would break her bloody neck" if she did not give up the house.

The case will be concluded to-day.

FRED NICHOLLS WITHDRAWS

Retires From Vice-Presidency of Dominion Iron and Steel.

Montreal, Oct. 18.—(Special)—The annual meeting of the Dominion Iron and Steel shareholders took place to-day, with J. H. Plummer, president, in the chair.

The new points which came out were the retirement of Fred, Nicholls as one of the vice-presidents, although he remains on the board. Graham Frazer's resignation as director of works was likewise confirmed. E. R. Wood of Toronto replacing him on the board.

It transpired that the earnings of the company for the four months ending Sept. 30, were \$7,000 a month, and the interest charges \$56,000, leaving from \$16,000 to \$17,000 a month for any purpose the directors may see fit.
