ST. LAWRENCE MARKET.

Receipts of farm produce on Saturday

were large, especially on the basket

market, and in the north market building,

where there were two rows of baskets

and wagons from north to south contain-

ing products of the farm and garden; be-

sides these there were about 16 loads of

hay and 100 bushels of grain.

The receipts were large, but the de-

mand was good, as hundreds of citizens

usual on Saturday, came down to get

their supplies for Sunday's dinner as well

as their butter and eggs for the week.

Two hundred bushels of fall

sold at \$1.07, and 100 bushels of goose

sold at 80c.

Barley—Three hundred bushels sold at

80c.

Oats—Five hundred bushels sold at 68c.

Buckwheat—None on sale, but worth

80c.

Hay—Sixteen loads sold at \$2.25 to \$2.35

per ton.

Potatoes—Not many on the market and

these were reported by the farmers as

selling at 75c to 80c per bushel, retail.

Car lots are unchanged. One dealer from

Frederickton, New Brunswick, informed

that he had disposed of seven

cars of Delawares at 70c per bag, on

track at Toronto, and had lost money on

the transaction. Ontario potatoes in the

market were scarce, but the bulk went to

the north.

Dressed Hogs—Prices ranged at \$3.25 to

\$3.50 per lb. cwt.

Apples—Prices are reported at \$1.50 to

\$2.00 per bushel.

Butter—There was a strong market for

butter at 20c to 22c, but the bulk went to

the north.

Eggs—Prices ranged at 25c to 32c

per dozen.

Ducks—Dressed, sold at 10c to 12c per lb.

Chickens—Dressed, sold at 10c to 12c per lb.

From 8c to 12c per lb. early in the day,

but at the close of the day the

best were firmer, some few lots

selling at 12c per lb.

Market Notes.

M. P. Mallon reports the poultry trade

as being fairly active, but the quality of

the market is the worst ever, generally

speaking.

Messrs. Barron, Thompson of Park &amp;

Thompson, and J. A. Paterson were the

principal buyers of the best lots of poultry.

Mr. Barron bought the finest ducks

of the week, 400 lbs., alive at \$5.00;

and the market this season, but no

chickens offered.

J. H. Wickham bought from Sam Mor-

gan, farmer, two choice veal calves,

dressed, at 10c per lb.; also nine calves

at 8c per lb., dressed; 13 calves were

bought from J. H. Wickham, at 8c per lb.

Mr. Wickham raised, as there are far too

few of this kind of veal calves raised.

Mr. Dunn improving.

R. J. Dunn, the market weighmaster,

is slowly improving, and is able to sit

up, but it will be some time before he

resumes his usual position.
