Some Changes Contemplated Which Will Likely Suit All.

men Tailors' Union and the merchant tailors' branch of the Retail Merchants' Association will end on Sept. 1, and several one of the new clauses calls for the employment of none but union men in union shops. At present the merchants employed non-union or union men just as they liked, as long as they paid the standard wages. In the new agreement the union will be responsible for supplying good men, and if they fail to do this the merchants may

There is another clause, regarding the classification of goods. At present the highest wages are paid by the tailors working on the best goods, so that it is essential that there should be a classification of goods in the different shops. The new agreement asks that the adjustments be made within two weeks, instead of rix weeks as formerly, and that the union and association each appoint two men to make the adjustments.


