SAGINAW TAKES A BRACE.

Fred Underwood, of the Western League, has signed with the Saginaw team. He pitched his first game against London on Thursday. Detroit released him, as that club had too many pitchers. Al Hagerman will join the Saginaw and will add strength to the pitching staff. He comes from the Omaha club of the Western League. Last year he was Day City's mainstay in the box. The Saginaw team is to be strengthened in all its weak points. Manager Black is determined to have an aggregation of baseball talent able to cope with any in the league.

HAMILTON'S COSTLY MISTAKE.

The Hams, after Wednesday's game at Port Huron, took it for granted that the club was scheduled for another game on Thursday, and did not realize their mistake until St. Thomas put in an appearance, when it was too late to catch the train for Bay City. Consequently it was necessary to postpone the game. Under the constitution of the league a club is liable to a penalty of \$100 for failure to appear for a scheduled game, and of \$10 for not furnishing the batting order by 10 o'clock a.m. of the day the game is assigned to, and the management of the Bay City club has made a demand on the league for these fines.

IN TILL THE FINISH.

The Bay City Tribune announces that at a meeting of those interested in the baseball association in that city Thursday evening the affairs of the organization were put in first-class shape. All outstanding indebtedness was settled in full. The players have all been paid. It is the intention of the management to make renewed effort to induce the people to turn out and give to the club the support it deserves. The book-ticket plan has been adopted, and an energetic canvass will be made among the business men, professional men, manufacturers and others in an endeavor to interest them in the game. The team will be kept in first-class shape, and the management is after the pennant, and announces determination to bring it to Bay City at the close of the season.

SECHREST FINED.

Saginaw has entered a protest against the manifest unfairness and prejudice of Umpire McNeerney, and hereafter will not play in any game where he umpires. Yesterday Daley was again on call. Daley sometimes makes the mistakes that are common to all human beings, but on the whole he is one of the fairest and best umpires to be found in this or any other league. Sechrest, the man with the black eye, does not have such a high opinion of Umpire Daley, for yesterday when he showed his anger at being struck out on called strikes, by throwing his bat viciously behind him, the umpire forthwith fined him \$5, being the first exhibition of the umpire's prerogative in this respect on the local grounds this season.—Saginaw Courier-Herald.

THE INTERNATIONAL'S CONDITION.
