A HEALTHY CAMP. Since the volunteers came to London there have been many false rumors circulated regarding the health of the men under canvas. Military medical men have no hesitation in saying that the health of the men generally has been better than at any previous camp. A false impression has been created by the number of men who were under treatment last Tuesday. There were some 42, but among these cases there was nothing more serious than a bilious attack, headache, or those affected by the heat of the sun, and the greater number were suffering from the latter. Major-General Hutton has had every facility used for the treatment of the sick, and the result of his management is apparent. There have been no cases in the hospital, says Sergt. Copeman, for a longer period than three days, except in the case of Ninham, who broke his collar bone. Principal Medical Officer Belton has heard many strange stories about deaths in the camp. These rumors are as utterly absurd as they are false.
