London, Oct. 4 .- The half-yearly report of the Grand Trunk Railway, just issued, shows the net traffic receipts for the six months to be £627,850 and the net revenue £730,672. As a matter of comparison for the same period in the previous year, the respective amounts were £559,923 and £654,395. Adding a small balance of £15 to the

surplus of the past half year leaves the total amount available for the purposes of dividend £106,667. The directors, on this favorable showing, recommended payment of the full half year's dividend on four per cent guaranteed stock, absorbing the sum of £104,395, leaving a balance of £2,-272 to add to the next half year's accounts. The passenger traffic, as compared with the same period in 1897, shows a decrease of £25,650, attributed to the cutting of rates, necessitated by the actions of competing roads. The mail service, freight, live stock and miscellaneous show, combined, an increase of £115,103. The number of passengers carried for the six months shows a falling off of 64,332, as compared with the first half year of 189%. The working expenses were £1,243,883, or 66.46 per cent; in the half year of 1897 they were £1,196,643, or 68.12 per cent. London, Oct. 4. - The Pekin correspondent of the Daily Mail, telegraphing on Sunday, says that the emperor vainly tried to escape from the palace, but was arrested by the dowager's people. The correspondent says that Chao-Shu-Chao, vice-president of the board of punishment, has been appointed to succeed Chang-Y-Buan as director of

the board of mines and railways. The British foreign office has no news of the death of the Emperor of China,

and discredits the report. The dowager empress has issued an edict in the name of the emperor, declaring that Kang-Yu-Wei, the Cantonese reformer, headed an attempt on the life of the dowager empress and conspired to subvert the Manchua dynasty, in both of which he had been detected and his plans foiled. Therefore, he and his partisans were trait-

ors and worthy of death. A special dispatch from Shanghai says that telegrams from Pekin have been detained two days. The last telegram received, according to this dispatch, announces that the foreign minister had held an emergency meeting with the commander of the German warship at Kiao-Chau. Marquis Ito, who, it is understood, is visiting China for the purpose of arranging an offensive and defensive alliance between China and Japan, owing to the possibility of prosecuting the negotiations during the crisis, has left Tien-Tsin for Shanghai. SLAUGHTER IN **EAST AFRICA**

American co-operation in China.

to Pieces. Helished, East Africa, Oct. 4.-An eye-witness thus describes the ambus-cade into which the detachment of the Fourth Bombay Rifles (consisting of 41 rifles, under Jemadar Radha Singh) fell on the Malkhanah road, near Camp Helished, East Africa, when a native officer and 27 non-commis-sioned officers and men were cut up: We had reached the hollow beyond the old huts on the Handaruff road, and were moving with advanced guard about 50 yards in front of the main body, which was in two files, the rearguard being about 100 yards in rear. The advanced guard had just emerged from the hollow into more open ground when a few of the enemy appeared close in their front. The moment they commenced to retire on the main body large bodies of the enemy sprang up from the grass on our right and rushed in on us, separating the advanced and rear-guards from the main body. The rush on our right was immediately followed by an overwhelming rush on our left. Jemadar Radha Singh, who was just in front of the main body, had barely time to give the command "ready" before he was struck down by five or six spears. The onslaught of the enemy was so sudden that is probable that some men were struck down before they could load their rifles. Strong Reasons for Sending U. S. Volunteers Home.

Sickness in Porto Rico Increasing at an Alarming Rate-Over 25 Per Cent on the Sick List.

Ponce, Porto Rico, Oct. 4 .- It is the well-grounded and almost unanimous opinion of the medical staff of the American army in Porto Rico that the condition of the volunteer forces here necessitates their removal north. Sickness is increasing, and has been increasing during the past three weeks, at an alarming rate. Today the sick report shows over 2,700 in hospitals or in quarters, out of a total com-mand of 10,000 men; that is, over 25 per cent of the troops are on the sick list. This, however, does not mean that there is an effective strength of 7,500 men. The soldiers discharged from the hospitals as fit for duty, in nine cases out of ten, are incapable of service. In the regular infantry regi-ments the sickness averages only about 10 per cent, while in the volunteer regiments it averages 34 per cent. The worst feature of the situation is

the steady increase in the number of typhoid cases, which today reaches over 400. THE SPANIARDS GOING. The American commissioners to arrange for the evacuation of Porto Rico have been eminently successful in their dealings with the Spanish commissioners, and it is believed that within two weeks at the furthest the last of the Spanish troops will have

sailed for home. Their mission has been accomplished without friction. The Spanish transport Isla de Panay has arrived here, and a second transport is expected soon. These, with a hospital ship, which will come from Havana to remove a number of sick troops, will carry away about 3,500 Spanish soldiers. Sufficient vessels are said to be now on their way here

to remove the remainder of the troops. MAULED BY A BEAR

Scene in Sanger's Circus Not on the

Programme. Windsor, Oct. 4 .- The visit of Sanger's circus to Windsor on Saturday was attended by a serious accident to one of the attendants, John Jamieson, aged 20, got into the van occupied by the two performing bears, one being a polar and the other a sloth. He aroused the latter from sleep, and began to box with it. The animal squared up to him, but apparently did not relish a blow he got on the nose, and then set on the younth in earnest.

The bear got Jamieson on his back and began clawing at his head. Another attendant was quickly brought to the spot, and, seizing a board thrust it into the animal's mouth. Jamieson was thus liberated, but before he could

snapped at his legs. The injured man was removed to the infirmary, bleeding profusely from wounds on the head, back and shoulders, some of the wounds being sever-
