Favorable Showing
Half-Yearly Report.

Emperor of China Arrested by the Dowager's People

While Trying to Escape From the Palace.

Situation Critical—Surrender of Kang-Yui Demanded.

Europeans Menaced by Riotous Natives in Shanghai.

Terrible Devastation Caused by the Barbadoes Storm—Official Statement of Losses—10,277 Laborers' Houses Destroyed—Canadians and Foreign Orders.

London, Oct. 4.—The half-yearly report of the Grand Trunk Railway, just issued, shows the net traffic receipts for the six months to be \$267,850 and the net revenue \$730,672. As a matter of comparison for the same period in the previous year, the respective amounts were \$559,923 and \$654,395. Adding a small balance of \$15 to the surplus of the past half year leaves the total amount available for the purposes of dividend \$106,567. The directors, on this favorable showing, recommended payment of the full half year's dividend on four per cent guaranteed stock, absorbing the sum of \$104,395, leaving a balance of \$2,172 to add to the next half year's accounts. The passenger traffic, as compared with the same period in 1897, shows a decrease of \$23,850, attributed to the cutting of rates, necessitated by the actions of competing roads. The mail service, freight, live stock and miscellaneous show, combined, an increase of \$115,103. The number of passengers carried for the six months shows a falling off of 64,332, as compared with the first half year of 1897. The working expenses were \$1,243,883, or 68.46 per cent, in the half year of 1897 they were \$1,196,643, or 68.12 per cent. The rearrangements of the international bridge at Buffalo will be renewed at an early date. Referring to the president's recent visit of inspection to Canada, the report says: "The Canadian Pacific dispute being settled, there are no valid reasons why the local passenger fares, reduced by the company, should not be restored, and the differences in the North Bay live lease settled. Negotiations are in progress to submit the points of difference to arbitration. The result of the past half year's operations shows improvements costing \$103,493. Several bridges between Montreal are to be removed, and also on the southern division. It is expected that the Victoria bridge new way of Shanghai, says: A mob is menacing foreigners. ARRESTED HIM

Emperor of China Nabbed as He Tried to Escape From the Palace.

London, Oct. 4.—The Pekin correspondent of the Daily Mail, telegraphing on Sunday, says that the emperor, but was arrested by the dowager's people. The correspondent says that Chao Shu-Chao, vice-president of the board of punishment, has been appointed to succeed Chang-Yi-Buan as director of the board of mines and railways. The British foreign office has no news of the death of the Emperor of China, and discredits the report.

The dowager empress has issued an edict in the name of the emperor, declaring that Kang-Yu-Wei, the Cantonese reformer, headed an attempt on the life of the dowager empress and conspired to subvert the Manchua dynasty. In both of which he had been detected and his plans foiled. Therefore, he and his partisans were traitors and worthy of death.

A special dispatch from Shanghai says that telegrams from Pekin have been detained two days. The last telegram received, according to this dispatch, announced that the foreign minister had held an emergency meeting with the commander of the German warship at Kiao-Chau, Marquis Ito, who, it is understood, is visiting China for the purpose of arranging an offensive and defensive alliance between China and Japan, owing to the possibility of prosecuting the negotiations during the crisis, has left Tien-Tsin for Shanghai. The foreign minister, it is stated, forbade any foreign residents going to Pekin.

It is expected in Shanghai that the crisis will result in a joint occupation of Pekin by the powers.

The Tsung Li Yamen has demanded that Sir Claude MacDonald, the British minister, shall surrender Kang-Yui, Yamanza, leader of the rebellion in the Shee-Chuen province, has issued a proclamation, ordering the extermination of all foreigners.

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SLAUGHTER IN EAST AFRICA

29 Men Surrounded by Rebels and Out to Pieces.

Helsheld, East Africa, Oct. 4.—An eye-witness thus describes the ambushade into which the detachment of the Fourth Bombay Rifles (consisting of 41 rifles, under Jemadar Radha Singh) fell on the Mukharhar road, near Camp Helsheld, East Africa, when a native officer and 27 non-commissioned officers and men were cut up: We had reached the hollow beyond the old hita on the Handaruff road, and were moving with advanced guard about 50 yards in front of the main body, which was in two files, the rear-guard being about 100 yards in rear. The advanced guard had just emerged from the hollow into more open ground when a few of the enemy appeared close in their front. The moment they commenced to retire on the main body large bodies of the enemy sprang up from the grass on our right and rushed in on us, separating the advanced and rear-guards from the main body. The rush on our right was immediately followed by an overwhelming rush on our left. Jemadar Radha Singh, who was just in front of the main body, had barely time to give the command "ready" before he was struck down by five or six spears. The onslaught of the enemy was so sudden that it was probable that some men were struck down before they could load their rifles. Those who could fire did so, and the enemy was checked slightly. We fired bayonets as opportunity offered, and firing retreated towards the dry bed of the lake in order to get clear of the jungle. When clear of the jungle we collected in small parties, and, firing on the flanks of the enemy who attempted to pursue us, retired towards the camp. Some of the enemy twice attempted to pursue us in the open, but could not face our fire, and took refuge in the bush. They were not less than 400 strong, and must have lost more men than we, since at the first discharge of our rifles some twenty of them fell and several others were shot or bayoneted during our retreat. After the enemy had ceased to pursue us we saw them carrying off some of their friends as had fallen outside the thick bush. The enemy, who were of the Ogaden tribe, carried off 27 Martini-Henry rifles and 25 sword bayonets, besides 1,640 rounds of ammunition.
