At 10 o'clock Mr. Adam Beck, the defeated candidate, was called for, and when he appeared he was accorded a rousing reception. He said he wished to express hearty thanks for the treatment he had received. "We are defeated," he said, "but we are not disgraced. They have not won the election by the largest number of votes in London—they have won it by getting Conservatives away from the city." 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the Conservative majority in the house at Toronto. "I have in my pocket," he said, "the evidence and documents ready to enter a protest against the election when we desire it. Col. Mr. Thomas D. Hodgins entered the hall at this juncture, followed by hundreds who wedged their way into the hall. Many of those inside feared a stampede and made towards the street. Mr. Hodgins, in his speech, paid Mr. Beck a glowing tribute, and proclaimed himself elected by 157.

After the speaking ceased, and the usual cheers had been given, a funeral procession was formed, headed by a bugle band. The cortege was followed closely by a back containing Mr. Adam Beck, Mr. Thomas Smallman, Thomas D. Hodgins, Wm. Gray, and Mr. Thos. Beattie. The pall-bearers carried burning brooms. They paraded around for awhile, and pulled up in front of the Conservative headquarters, where more speaking was indulged in.

STILL MORE TALK.

Mr. Beck told his hearers that the people had by their votes told the government that they wanted it no longer, and Mr. Leys, his opponent, was not a member, but only a figurehead. Mr. T. D. Hodgins felt sure at heart for the way in which London had disgraced itself in the manner it had acted on this occasion.

Mr. Wm. Gray appealed to the Conservatives and friends of Mr. Adam Beck to hand in any information concerning bribery and corruption on the part of Liberals, and said: "We will give them all the fight they want; we'll give them a protest to fight, and then they can fight this fight over again." Cheers for Whitney, Adam Beck, Mr. Beattie and the Queen were given, and the crowd broke up.

The Election Bulletin.

The Advertiser, as usual, caught the

crowd, and held it. 16 bulletins were the first and the best. In addition to a list of the constituents displayed from the second story windows, electric-light stereoscopic views were projected on a sheet across the street by Mr. W. Cotton. The instrument, working to perfection, and the bulletins, cartoons, pictures, etc., could be seen with great distinctness by the assembled thousands, and excited cheers and laughter. Mr. J. P. Hunt, the artist, made capital of the sketches of Col. Leys, Mr. Beck, Hon. A. S. Hardy, Mr. Whitney and other notables. The position was given a generous share of attention, as the pig was largely in evidence. One picture showed the defeated St. John sitting on his porcine friend, and underneath was the inscription, "His Sit." This and other humorous hits were greeted with roars of laughter. The crowd did not disperse until nearly midnight.

NOTES.
The police highly praise the conduct of the victorious party. Not one disturbance arose, and there were no collisions between the opposing camps. The Liberals did not attempt to annoy the Conservatives by parading through their ranks, but obeyed the injunction of the police, and avoided the street between Queen's avenue and Dundas street. The prohibition of "Newspaper Row" was a good move, and the crowds appreciated it.

A voter named Daly cast his ballot at subdivision 1 of ward 1, and was arrested on the complaint of Mr. R. M. C. Tothoe and other Conservative scrutineers, who charged that he was a personator. Mr. Daly indignantly denied the accusation, and was bailed out by a friend. He claims that he has a perfect right to vote, and will probably prosecute those who caused his arrest.

Mr. Adam Beck made a brief speech from the Free Press window to his fellow-mourners. Among other things he remarked: "I said, when I came before you first, that I was a sport. I am still a sport; I will die a sport; we're still sports, and we're not dead at all. (Laughter and cheers.)"

Radical Rule Unanimously Adopted for the Suppression of Rowdy Ball Playing.

NEW AND IMPORTANT RULE.

St. Louis, Mo., March 1.—Most radical legislation was enacted today by the magnates of the National Baseball League, when they adopted the suppression of obscene, indecent and vulgar language upon the ball field as the best means of preserving the respectability of the twelve clubs present without a dissenting vote. The sweeping of this measure are most of guilty persons before a tribunal of judges, to be known as the board of discipline, which shall punish the culprit either by suspension or expulsion for life. The first tribunal is composed of members of the national league. They will serve respectively for three years and one year.
