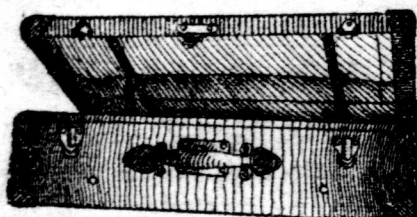

GREATEST COLD WAVE OF WINTER

Will Arrive Between the 3rd and
7th of January, Says the
Rev. Hicks.

In his weather forecasts for January,
Rev. Irl R. Hicks says we may reason-
ably count on having in many sec-
tions, within 70 hours of sunset on
Jan. 3, general and heavy winter
storms, amounting to blizzards and
blockades in many sections, with

progressively out of the northwest. A
careful reading of the January fore-
