#### BELGIAN KING AND QUEEN ENTER GHENT WHILE CHEERING CROWDS SHOWER THEM WITH FLOWERS

Official Entrance of Belgium's Rulers to Famous City Is Marked With Outbursts of Joy From Thousands of Enthusiast ic People.

Whent, Nov. 13.-King Albert, Queen Estzabeth and Prince Leopold of Belglum made their official entrance into Ghent today. Huge crowds, delirious with enthusiasm, lined the streets. The coyal party moved through cheering through samid showers of roses and through them. thropgs amid showers of roses and shryaanthemums. Every baloony, window and roof was covered with people, tome of whom clung perilously near to channeys and cornices. The royal party extered through the Bruges gate at 11 p'clock. The king wore the uniform of a Belgian general without decorations. Trince Leopold, in the uniform of a palvate soldier of a second-line regiment, rode a white prancing Arabiah. Both the king and the prince had steel helmets on their heads. The king rode tall bay horse. The queen looked slenter and girlish as she sat on her huge brown horse with elegant ease. She fore a simple champagne-colored tabit. The troops which entered the city braned the first division of the Belgian Lamy. In peace times the men were markered at Ghent. Reception for Veterani

They were given a great reception by the offizens, their battered helmets and attared uniforms bearing evidence of the recent fighting. The flag borne by the troops was inscribed with the name of "Clarckem," the place where this division smashed the German lines on September 28 and entered Houtholst Forest. The royal party halted in the centre of place D'Armes and reviewed the whole first division, these soldiers being veterans of the whole four years' war. PREMIER ARRIVES IN LONDON.
...London. Nov. 18.—Sir Robt. L. Borden, prime minister of Camada, reached London today to attend the peace conferences. He was met by a distinguished gathering, including Premier Lloyd George and Col. Claude Willoughby, representing the king. A guard of honor of the 17th Canadian Reserve Regiment was drawn up on the platform.

Sir Robert drove off with Mr. Lloyd George amid enthusiastic cheers from large crowds.

Sir Robert is accompanied by Sir George Foster, minister of trade and commerce; Hon. Arthur Sifton, minister of customs; Frank Jones, vice-chairman Canadian War Trade Board; Dr. James Robertson, representative of the department of agriculture; Col. C. M. Biggar, representing the militia department, and P. M. Draper, secretary of the Trades and Labor Congress. Hon. C. J. Doherty, minister of justice, and Lloyd Harris chairman of the new Canadian Trade Mission in London, left a few days ago to join the party in London.

Paris, Nov. 18.—The last German troops left Brussels yesterday, according to a dispatch from the Hawas correspondent from the Beigian front. Extraordinary scenes were witnessed around the North Station, from which most of the enemy soldiers departed. Wishing to have money to take home with them, they sold everything they owned or had stolen. Some laid out objects on the sidewalks and cried their wares in loud voices. Among the articles offered for sale were blankets, clothing and shoes, as well as wool and copper goods taken from the inhabitants of the city. #### ALSACE-LORRAINE DAY IS CELEBRATED IN FRENCH CAPITAL

More Than 200,000 Parisians March in Procession.

Paris, Nev. 17.-Today was Alsace celebrated not by victorious troops marching through the city, but by countless processions of civilians on parade before 10,000 troops scattered along the route from the Arch de Triomphe to the Place de la Concorde, and then past the Monuments of Joan of Arc, Gambetta and Lafayette.

It is estimated that 200,000 members of societies of every social kind marched in the processions, and it seemed as if the remainder of Paris, taking advantage of the clear, cold weather, lined the route.

#### CZECHO-SLOVAKS' AID IN FUTURE TO BE FOR RUSSIANS

Await Word Regarding the Policy of Allies in Russia.

Peking, Nov. 16 .- Whatever aid is ent to Russia henceforth will be considered for the Russians alone the correspondent is informed by the Czecho-Slovak headquarters at Vladivostok, as the Czechs have amply cared for the Allied forces, furnishing munitions, supplies and money.

with Bohemia freed, the Czechs have no further interest in Russia's national ambitions. They are anxious to leave for their homes. The delivered Czechs could negotiate an armistice with the Boisheviki along the Volga and pass through European Russia toward their homeland, but they await word regarding the Allies' Russian policy.

Czechs Are Ready.

The Czechs were ready for a frontal attack, but, being greatly outnumbered, were forced to retreat eastward to save their forces. One-fifth of the Czech forces already have been killed or wounded in the Russian fighting.

Regardless of the outcome of the aid planned by France and America, the Russian civilians along the present lines must be sustained throughout the winter. E. N. Frazar, member of the American Red Cross Commission, says the organization is equipped to handle the situation. Early reports stating that there were 100,000 refugees are dwindling. ## FORMED IN GERMANY

Baden and Saxe-Meiningen Are Latest To Join In the

Movement.

Basel, Nov. 17.—More of the smaller Germen principalities have followed the example of their larger neighbors and have taken steps toward establishing republican forms of government.

Saxe-Meiningen has been proclaimed a republic and all estates owned by princes are made public property.

A special dispatch from Karlsruhe says that the provisional government has announced that Grand Duke Friedrich II. has abdicated and that Baden is a free republic. A constituent assembly will later determine the form of government to be established.
