APPROVED BY CONSTITUENTS Attorney-General Declares That Personnel of Investigating Commission Is About Completed — M. M. McBride, Member for Brantford, Says He Has No Reason To Retract Any Statement Made Regarding Raney.

Toronto, July 13.—That Hon. W. E. Raney has received word from some of his constituents to appear before them and explain his attitude on the hydro-radial policy of the United Farmers' Government is all a myth, was the statement of the attorney-general this morning, who read from letters from some of his constituents indorsing his stand and that of the premier.

"So you see I'm not afraid of the recall," commented Mr. Raney.

Mr. Raney said that the personnel of the hydro-radial commission has practically been decided on by the Government, but that no announcement will be made until everything is certain.

"We are not going to announce the names piecemeal," said Mr. Raney, "although the mind of the Government is more or less made up. There has been no trouble in getting commissioners and there will be no unnecessary delay in making the announcement."

London, July 13 .- Ten thousand Jews, in a demonstration in Albert Hall on the occasion of Great Britain's acceptance of the mandate for Palestine, last night unanimously adopted resolutions expressive of appreciation of "the illustrous services rendered the Jewish nation by the statesmen and peoples of the allied and associated powers, particularly

The resolutions pledged the Jews "to spare no effort or sacrifice for the rebuilding of Palestine as a Jewish national home, in collaboration with the inhabitants of the country."

Arthur J. Balfour, lord president of the council, and others addressed the meeting. Mr. Balfour, who was accorded an ovation lasting several minutes, said he hoped the Arabs in Palestine would remember that Great Britain freed them and made no trouble. He said he anticipated the greatest difficulty would be the inability of the Jews to work together and obey their leaders.

Max Nordau, replying to Mr. Balfour, asserted that the Jews, as well as the English, were politicians, and that the British statesmen could be assured that "we want to be Great Britain's sentry on the Asia frontier, and if you will permit us to grow as strong as we desire we will watch the Suez Canal for you and be a useful ally, if necessary.'
