RAIL MEN MAY BOYCOTT FIRMS TO HELP STRIKE

Canadian National Employees
Will Refuse To Handle
Freight.

SYDNEY, N. S., Dec. 22.—On and after December 23, the employees of the Canadian National Railways will refuse to handle freight of any kind originating on, or destined for the properties of the Dominion Steel Corporation and the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company until these corporations consent to submit the present difficulties with striking railwaymen, formerly employed in their yard, to a board of arbitration.

This announcement was made here this afternoon by J. W. Cockell, locomotive engineer, chairman of the striking yardmen at the local steel plant, after containing the announcement and signed by a committee representing respectively the engineers, firemen, trainmen and conductors of the Canadian National lines, has been sent to Assistant General Manager W. A. Klugland, at Montreal.

The strike of about 150 railwaymen in the employ of the Dominion Steel Corporation and Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company has been in progress for a month.

ITALIAN BOAT SHELLS FORCES OF D'ANNUNZIO

Torpedoboot Destroyer Zeffiro
Reported in Action at
Veglia.

ROME, Dec. 22.—The Italian torpedoboot destroyer Zeffiro has shelled the forces of Gabriele d'Annunzio occupying Veglia, says the Stefani Agency. The Legionnaires, who landed at Castelli, marched to Zara, but on the way left their commanding officer and six men and two machine guns in the hands of the regular troops. The Legionnaires already in Zara made their escape in a collier.

Other raids on military positions have been carried out in Dalmatia.

CAMLACHIE FARMER HANGS HIMSELF IN BARN ON HIS FARM

Financial Difficulties Believed
To Be Cause of the
Tragedy.

SARNIA, Dec. 22.—Disney Delmage, a well-known cattleman of Camlachie, hanged himself in his barn on today in that village. Financial losses are said to have caused the deed. The late Mr. Delmage, who was about 55 years of age, had been up town in the morning, transacting some business. Leaving for his home he was not seen until he was found hanging from a beam in his own barn. He was a pastmaster of the Masonic Order and widely known throughout the county. His wife and one child survive.
