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German Government Leaders Claim Allied Reparations Demands Impossible To Meet

Foreign Minister Simons Declares Execution of Terms Would Bankrupt Germany, Whose Financial Collapse Would Drag Down France and Other Countries in Central Europe—Tax Levy on Exports Condemned by Bank Official—German Mark Declines in Value When Terms Are Announced.

Berlin, Feb. 1.—German leaders regard the reparations terms offered upon by the supreme Allied council in Paris last week as fantastic and impossible of execution, and it is the general opinion that the Government cannot agree to them.

Madness is the term leaders of the Reichstag used in discussing the reparations conditions. Foreign Minister Simons declared the execution of the terms would produce chaos not only in Germany, but throughout Central Europe, as the bankruptcy of Germany would also bankrupt part of Germany's war creditors, among whom is France.

The German mark showed a sharp decline toward the close of yesterday's session of the house when the terms became generally known.

PROF. KEYNES' CALCULATIONS. London, Feb. 1.—It will be impossible for Germany to pay the amounts fixed for her reparations debt to the Allies by the supreme Allied council at Paris last week, says Prof. John Maynard Keynes, principal representative of the British treasury at the Versailles peace conference.
