At the last meeting of the Markham Township Council the assessment roll submitted shows total value of \$3,-269,776. The easterly half of the township represents a value cf \$1,591,845, and the west, \$1,677,931. In addition to this Unionville, which is a police village, represents \$64,880 and Mount Joy, \$49,475.

Markham Township will this year contribute \$6053.57 for general purposes, \$1079.62 for the Industrial Home, and \$579.91 for court house debentures. The rate levied by the township is as follows: County, \$7713, 2.04 mills on the dollar; township rate, \$9614 at 3 mills; Unionville police village levy, \$259.95 at 4 mills; Mount Joy, police village, \$148.42 a t3 mills; and the public school according to requisitions.




