-The statement that Saskatchewan is the greatest grain province in the west and it is giving an annual yield in excess of the total of the other twoprovinces, does not convey to the mind any idea of the vastness of the wheat belt of the province. For ten days Sir Wilfrid Laurier's party has been making a checker-board of the province, covering the country thoroly between Prince Albert, Saskatoon and Regina. While the last need not necessarily termed the best as yet, the spectacle can be truly said to be the fairest that the eye has seen. The World correspondent went thru 35 miles of country by motor to-day,

which is part of an area 110 miles long, and in which there is farming land that has no superior in the world. Not a vacant section was to be found; not a dilapidated farm building was to be seen anywhere; the land was clear of debris and rubbish, and the shack frame cottage of a few years ago, which was the grain grower's home, has given way to a brick house, with telephone connection and all the with telephone connection and all the comforts of city life. Bereft of iselated position, these men have brought farm life to the nearest approach to the ideal that has ever been reached. For the past few days a bait crop has not been seen. Saskatchewan, ac ing to its own agricultural experts, will have a 75 per cent. crop. 




