C. P. R. PAYS \$10,000 DAMAGES TO WIDOW

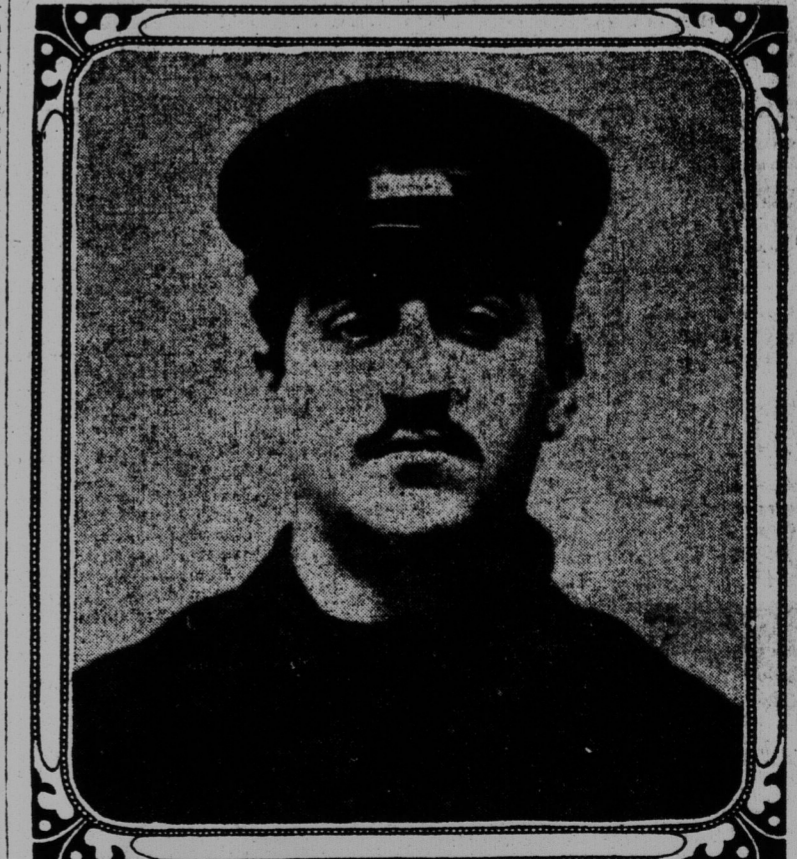

Constantino, Accused as Murderer, Declares Woman Killed Herself.

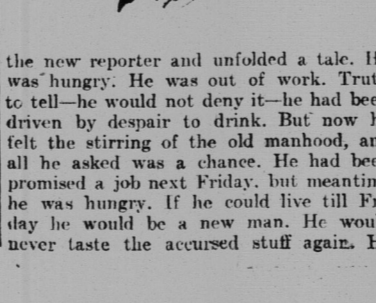
