

# BUNKER MURPHY CLINCHES TROPHY FOR LEADING PITCHER

## VICTORY OVER ROYALS GIVES HIM TITLE OF PITCHING ACE

### Crucial Series Between Giants and Pirates Starts Today

Tack Dalton and Lloyd Stirling Have Chance to Win Second Place—Earl Nelson Gains On Charlie Gorman

**BUNKER MURPHY** has won the beautiful silver trophy emblematic of the pitching ace of the City Senior League, as a result of his victory over the Royals in last Saturday's game. The official averages show Murphy winning eight and only losing one game, while his team mate, Tack Dalton, has won seven and lost two. As they have only one more game to play, Tack has no chance to win. Lloyd Stirling of the Water Department team has won 10 and lost three, but even if he pitches and wins his final game, Murphy would still be leading. This trophy is being donated by Commissioner Wigmore.

Earl Nelson gained a few points on Charlie Gorman on Saturday as a result of getting one safety out of two trips to the plate. He is now out in front with 4.68, while Gorman has 4.59. Paul, popular third-baseman of the Royals, is third with 3.93.

**Looks Like Winner.** From present indications it looks as if Paul Fraser has clinched the trophy for the leading base stealer. He has a total of 20, while his nearest competitors, Gorman and Nelson, have 15 each.

### BASE BALL SIMPLIFIED

IS IT possible for a team second at bat in the fifth inning or any inning thereafter to win a game in its half that is unfinished because of being called on account of rain of darkness?

For instance, when the home team goes to bat in the last of the eighth, the score is 4-1 against it. The home team proceeds to score four runs in the half and has two on the bases and two out when the umpire calls the game.

What is the score?

THE home team won the game cited by the score of 6-4. When a game is called by the umpire because of rain or darkness, and the side second at bat shall, before the completion of an inning score at least one more run than the side first at bat, the score shall be the total number of runs each team has made.

When the home team in the case cited scored four runs in the last of the eighth and only two were out, it had tallied one more run than the side first at bat, since the score at the start of the inning was 4-1 against the home team.

No thought is given the fact that the side was not retired before the game was called. As a matter of fact, the home team made the necessary runs to win without making use of the three outs to which it was entitled.

The situation here is much the same as in the ninth inning of any extra inning, in which the home team puts over the winning run before the third out is made.

The game ends then and there. A called game, where the home team makes at least one more run in an unfinished inning, is regarded in the same light.

### Champion Tilden Loses Match to Grant Holman

DETROIT, Mich., Aug. 9.—Grant Holman, of Leland Stanford University, defeated William T. Tilden, National champion in an exhibition match today at the Detroit Tennis Club, as a feature of the Western Clay Court Tennis Championship. Tilden suffered severely from a lame shoulder, losing in straight sets, 7-5; 9-7.

### PENNANT RACE MAY BE DECIDED IN THESE GAMES

Frisch Injured And Will Not Be Able To Play

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—Baseball's focus today centres upon the opening of a four game series between the Pirates and Giants, at Pittsburgh, which promises to go a long way towards settling the National League flag race.

Buried by six straight defeats during the past week, the Giants yesterday turned the tables on the ambitious Reds, five to four, after an eighth inning rally which netted three runs. However, the victory was partly offset by an injury to Frankie Frisch, shortstop, who hurt his hand again in trying to field a low throw to second base by Terry. Frisch may be out of the game for some time. As the Corsairs are leading the championship by four and one half games in the pennant chase, the McGraw club will be unable to pass them in the present series. The wildest hope of a come-back would be a clean sweep of the issue which would even then allow the Pirates a margin of a half game lead.

**Reds are Gaining**

However, Cincinnati has jumped into the thick of the fight, trailing the Giants by two and one half games. The Reds are carded to hook up in a series with Pittsburgh, after the New York Club. Hank Gowdy, veteran Giant catcher, interviewed owners of the Columbus Club of the American Association yesterday. He is angling for the managernship of the Columbus team in his home town. John McGraw declared he had a long standing agreement whereby he would not let the way if Gowdy had an opportunity to better himself.

**Cubs Down Braves**

The Cubs whacked out a double victory over the Braves, 8 to 1, and 12 to 8, Chicago banging four Boston twirlers for 17 hits in the second game. Rogers Hornsby increased his home run crop to 29 for the season by helping himself to two in the victory over the Phillies, 8 to 4. He also hit a triple. Friberg, Phillies second baseman, was put out of the game for arguing with the umpire.

**Senators Lose Quil**

Two 12 inning games marked the events in the American League yesterday, the Indians subduing the Senators 7 to 6, and the Yankees dropping their fourth straight to the White Sox, 4 to 2.
