TO BUILD SUBWAY AT M'ADAM JCT.

C. P. R. in Return Will Get Fixed Valuation of \$205,000.

Fredericton, July 3.—The Municipal Council of York this afternoon adopted a resolution moved by Councillor Whipple, and seconded by Councillor Gaynor, both of McAdam, whereby legislation is to be promoted under which the valuation for assessment of the Canadian Pacific Railway in the parish of McAdam will be fixed at \$205,000 for a term of 10 years. In return for this fixed valuation the railway is to construct a subway beneath it tracks at a point largely used as a crossing. If the arrangement is made to the satisfaction of all, the railway will bear the entire cost of the subway, estimated at \$18,000. Otherwise the railway commission bears 25 per cent, and the railway and parish divide the remainder.
