### BRITISH FOOTBALL

(Canadian Press Cable.)

London, Feb. 12.—Liverpool with forty-one points has now gained such a substantial lead in the first division of the English soccer league that the club seems to have a firm grasp of the championship. The surprise in this division has been the gradual decline of last year's champions, Burnley, who have now dropped to fifth place.

Nottingham Forest are unshaken at the top of the second league. They face their biggest task of the season next Saturday in the cup game at Cardiff. The latter are the most improved team in the country and after a long sojourn at the bottom of the first division table have reached fourth place thanks to a remarkable succession of victories at home and away. They are one of the fancied teams for the cup, but Nottingham Forest are likely to give them a very hard game. It is possible that the latter will draw the game thanks to their very fine defence which has conceded fewer goals than any other team in the second division this season. This defence has only been beaten 13 in 27 games.

Stoke who reached the second place in the second division are now strongly challenging Fulham's and West Ham's ambition to accompany Nottingham Forest into the first division next season.

Among the best goal-scoring feats yesterday were three goals in each in the case of Crowther for Hartlepool; Miller for Grimsby town, and Hall for Gillingham.

At the meeting of the Toronto Steamship Ticket Agents' Association held recently, the subject of war tax on ocean tickets was taken up.

The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Minister of Finance for the Dominion Government with a view to having the revenue tax placed on a more equitable basis, so that third-class ocean passengers would not have to pay—as at present—the same high revenue of \$6 as saloon passengers, the suggestion being that the present tax of \$5 be collectable on saloon passengers, \$3 on second-class, and \$1 on third-class bookings.

BYNG ATTENDS OLD TRINITY.

Montreal, Feb. 12.—Lord Byng of Vimy, governor-general of Canada, attended divine service at Old Trinity church here this morning and was accompanied by his A. D. C. and other members of his household.

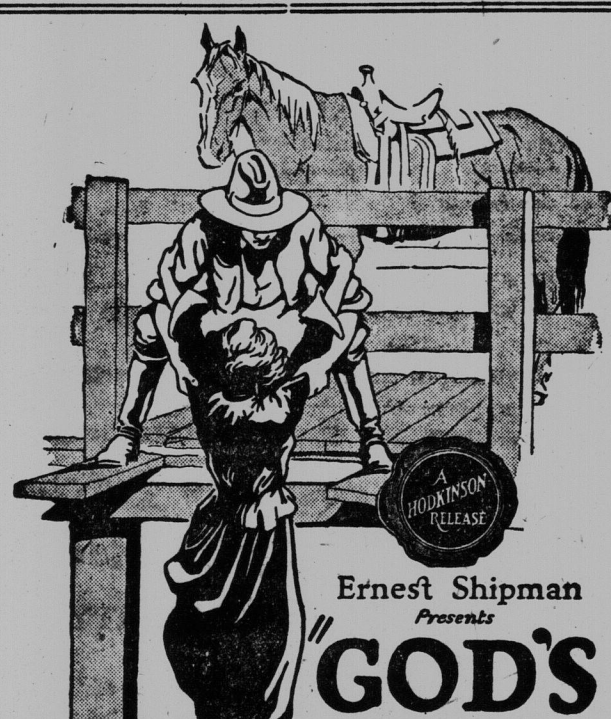
