

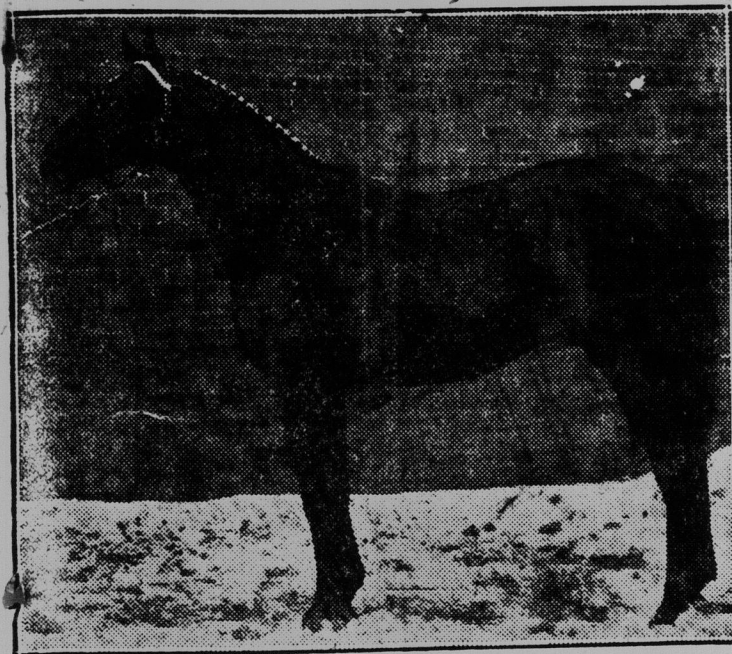

ENGLISHMAN BEATS LYNCH.

Fast Eight Round Bout in Newark, N. J.

Little Briton Makes It a Whirlwind Finish—Sets Hot Pace for American.

New York, Dec. 22.—Joe Fox, of England, defeated Joe Lynch, of this city, in a fast eight-round bout at the Newark Sportsman's Club in Newark tonight.

The little Briton put up a whirlwind finish. In the final round he landed a right hook on Lynch's jaw and the New Yorker hit the floor with a thud. It was not a knockout, but Lynch was on his feet at the bell.

The weights were announced as Lynch 123½ pounds, Fox 123½ pounds. Jim Brennan was the third man in the ring. Fox did most of the early leading. He used a fast left jab to advantage in the opening round. Lynch countered cleverly, but the round went to the Englishman on his aggressiveness. There were few hard blows struck.

VICAR STARTS DANCING CLASS

London, Eng., Dec. 22.—A vicar's application for a music and dancing license for the Church Hall, where he and his wife conduct dancing classes, was a feature of the business at Norwich license sessions. The license was granted.

The applicant was the Rev. John Green, vicar of St. Luke's, New Catton, Norwich.

He told the bench that, seeing the great demand for dancing, it had, almost of necessity, become a part of the social work of his parish. There was a parish dancing class open to all, irrespective of religious denomination. It consisted of about 100 persons of the working classes, and met once a week, his wife and himself being always present.

There was a professional teacher, and the dancers each paid 5s. for 12 lessons. The success of these classes showed the demand there was for such recreation amongst the artisan class, and he considered that the church should provide and supervise it.

The bench attached to the license the condition that the vicar and his wife would both be present at any public dance, and that the matter would come up again at the February sessions.
