THE VALLEY RAILWAY, HON. MR. PUSSLEY MAKES EVERY EFFORT FOR CONSTRUCTION
Ottawa, July 20.—Hon. Mr. Pugsley is making every effort to facilitate the construction of the St. John Valley Railway. Messrs. Fleming, McLeod and Gould are here seeking modifications in the terms of the agreement under which the Intercolonial will operate the road under a 50 year lease and with the payment of 40 per cent of the earnings as rental. On the part of the provincial government Dr. Pugsley has agreed that the road may be constructed from Grand Falls to Fredericton with a maximum grade of one per cent and provided the remainder is built to the standard of the Transcontinental. The rails are to be 30 pounds.
