

U. S. HOLDS KEY TO PEACE, SAYS BISHOP BLAKE

Calls War Sure Without Disarmament Based on Guarantees—These Worthless Without America.

In a striking address at the annual Thanksgiving service at the Metropolitan Memorial Episcopal church, Bishop Edward Blake of Paris, pictured the United States as holding the key to peace. He pleaded for aid to Europe and held the United States had a moral obligation to complete the task begun on the battlefield. War is inevitable without disarmament and disarmament cannot come without guarantees, while guarantees are ineffective without America, according to Bishop Blake. He spoke of the general European situation and with special reference to France where he has been for the last two years. He was introduced by Bishop William McDowell.

"Whether we like it or not, America must lend her aid to Europe if peace is to come to the world," said Bishop Blake. "We must face the fact that war is inevitable without disarmament, that disarmament is impossible without guarantees, that guarantees are ineffective without America."

Heard "Damn Europe" Here.
This would be an unwelcome gospel, the speaker said, to many Americans. He declared the first words which greeted him as he landed in New York in November were, "damn Europe! Let stew in its own juice. America has one enough."

"The profanity was not so surprising as the sentiment," added Bishop Blake. "I do not believe it represents the real mind and heart of the American people, once that mind and heart are freed with the truth."

"Economically nothing could be more absurd than to allow Europe to stew in its own juice. We must not forget that the United States is producing more than it can consume. It is said that our surplus of cotton alone last year amounted to more than 4,000,000 bales. There was a similar surplus of other raw materials, minerals, foodstuffs and manufactured articles. A nation that is producing 800,000,000,000

worth of goods annually must have a market for its products outside its own borders if its mines and farms and factories are to continue their normal output.

"Europe is America's largest customer. Under normal conditions she consumes more than 80 per cent. of our total exports. When conditions are abnormal in Europe and her markets are closed against us, as they are at the present time, we are confronted with overproduction, stagnation, depression, unemployment, misery, unrest and social danger in America. The peace and prosperity of America absolutely depend upon the restoration of Europe. We cannot permit Europe to stew in its own juice! Our welfare rises or falls with her. We must lend a hand in her rehabilitation or run the risk of our own undoing."

"But there are certain moral implications in the present situation that are much more profound than the economic ones. At the close of the war virtually every European treasury was empty. The nations were bankrupt. There was only one solvent nation, and that was the United States. We came out of the war with our resources unimpaired. Our national wealth was \$20,000,000,000 greater than it was a decade ago. No nation ever possessed the riches that are ours today."

Wealth Carries Obligations.
"What is the meaning of the prosperity and the wealth that the good God has lavished upon America? Has it been given to us to use for ourselves and ourselves alone? No normally minded man can think this for a minute. Prosperity carries obligations as well as benefits."

He opposed insistence on repayment of the loans to the Allies, said the fundamental issues of the war were the same at the close as at the beginning and that the primary purpose of France at Versailles was protection, not reparation. He recalled that Clemenceau wanted a buffer state between France and Germany, but Great Britain opposed it. He asserted there was not a nation in Europe that would not disarm if it dared to, but said Europe alone and unaided lacked the moral faith and leadership to attempt it.

AUTONOMISTS ACTIVE.
Movement for Independence in Sardinia.
Rome, Nov. 10.—(By mail)—The movement for autonomy in the island of Sardinia seems to be taking an alarming turn. The extreme wing of the Sardinian "Party of Action" is at the head of the movement, which is anti-Monarchical and anti-Fascist in character. Although no conflicts are reported, open acts of rebellion to the authorities have taken place, and the prefect of Cagliari has cabled to the Minister of the Interior informing him of the gravity of the situation. The government has given orders to check the movement.

ANCIENT TOMB SEALED.
Grave Ordered Closed Until Savants Arrive.
Cairo, Dec. 7.—Lord Carnarvon has decided to re-seal King Tut-en-Hamun's tomb for a period of some weeks, pending the arrival of Egyptologists from England, and possibly others from America. He is anxious to obtain American expert assistance in classifying the data already obtained and their co-operation at a later formal opening of the inner chambers, which are still undisturbed.
Arrangements are now being made to preserve the historic objects and facilitate their removal to the Cairo museum.

PAID \$1,052,487 IN FINES

Brooklyn Traffic Violators Are Heavily Fined.

New York, Dec. 7.—Violators of traffic ordinances in Brooklyn alone paid \$1,052,487 fines in seven months of this year. The records just made public date from March 18 to November 1. The traffic court handed 118,836 cases during that period. Reckless driving brought in 2,145 cases. For leaving the scene of accident, 248 drivers were arrested. Driving while intoxicated caused the arrest of 362 persons. In all, 2,977 persons were sent to jail.

was taken to hospital. Two of the rescuers also had to be treated there for burned hands.

Several large tubes containing a mixture of phosphorus have been washed ashore at Dover, apparently from a war wreck. The tubes are thought to have been used in the war to make

smoke screens by vessels of the Dover patrol which attacked Zebrugge. Carvill went on to the beach and put some of the mixture into his pocket, and as he walked on to the parade it set fire to his clothes. The tubes will be examined and handed over to the military or naval authorities.

London, Nov. 8.—(By Mail).—Fanny Ziden, 40, an Austrian, and Polly Kuppelch, 28, a Pole, pleaded "guilty" at the Guildhall yesterday to begging in Bishopsgate. When Ziden was arrested £133 was found in her possession, including eleven sovereigns. Mr. Hinde, for the defence, said this money represented her savings, which she always carried about with her. She was of a miserly disposition, and lived on a little cocoa, made with water, and dry bread. The other woman had a sick husband, and during the summer had worked hard to support him and their child. Alderman Sir Alfred Bower fined Ziden £5, and discharged Kudenholt.
